Barking dogs cost owner nearly £400 after ignoring council advice

Nuisance barking by up to eight dogs that caused "misery" for neighbours, has landed their owner with a fine of almost £400.

Czeslaw Lukiewicz, of Warrington Square, Dagenham, pleaded guilty at Barkingside Magistrates' Court on 20 September after breaching a noise abatement notice.

The council took action after receiving more than 75 complaints from neighbours.

When council enforcement officers visited the address, they found as many as eight Staffordshire Bull Terriers being kept at the property.

Despite being given written warnings, the barking continued, leading to a noise abatement notice being issued, under section 80 of the Environmental Protection Act 1980. However, this still didn't stop the nuisance behaviour and the council decided to prosecute after recording two breaches of the legally enforceable notice.


Mr Lukiewicz was ordered to pay £100 each for the two breaches of the noise abatement notice, £100 costs and an £80 victim surcharge.

Celebrating Black History Month 2022

The Nigerian flag was flown outside Barking Town Hall on Friday (30 September) to mark the country's 62nd Independence Day.

Members of the public joined councillors for the ceremony, which saw the bicolour triband of green, white and green raised atop of the council's community flagpole.

Figures from the Office of National Statistics estimate there are around 20,000 residents in Barking and Dagenham who were born in Nigeria.

The flag-raising event also marked the unofficial beginning of Black History Month in the borough, which runs throughout October.

National Hate Crime Awareness Week runs from Saturday 8 to Saturday 15 October and there are a range of activities to get involved in, including:


- Information stalls at Barking Town Hall

Hate crime is any crime that targets a person because of hostility or prejudice towards that person's disability, race or ethnicity, religion or belief, sexual orientation or transgender identity.

Help and support available for residents through the Household Support Scheme

Residents who may be struggling with their finances or to make ends meet are being encouraged to get in touch.

Funding is available to vulnerable residents to support them with essentials over the coming months.

Residents can apply online or email benefits@lbbd.gov.uk.

There are also a number of other support services including:

- Our Community Food Clubs which are free of charge and can provide £20 worth of food per week for a period of either three or six months at www.lbbd.gov.uk/community-food-clubs
- Our money and debt webpages provide an income and expenditure calculator and budgeting tools that will help people understand how much money they have coming in and how much is going out, helping them look at areas where they can make savings at www.lbbd.gov.uk/money-and-debt

- Residents who are worried about their finances and need help to tackle debt can now get advice and support from our local Barking and Dagenham Money website at: www.bdmoney.co.uk
- People struggling with increasing energy costs should contact their energy supplier about possible funds they may be entitled to, to help them through difficult periods. They can also access the Warm Homes Grant at www.gov.uk/the-warm-home-discount-scheme
- People with disabilities who aren't claiming specific disability benefits
 may be able to take advantage of a number of benefits available,
 including Personal Independence Payments, Disability Living Allowance
 (for children), and Universal Credit. For those caring for someone with
 disabilities they may be able to claim Carer's Allowance although this is
 means tested, at www.gov.uk/financial-help-disabled/disability-and-sickness-benefits
- People with a water meter who are experiencing financial difficulties may
 want to look into the Watersure scheme at
 www.ofwat.gov.uk/households/customer-assistance. Most water
 companies also have a fund to help those who are struggling, and it
 might be worth contacting their water provider.
- People who are out of work and looking to get into employment can get help and support from our Job Shops at www.lbbd.gov.uk/help-finding-work
- Anyone worried about a lack of skills can find courses and support on the Adult College website at https://adultcollege.lbbd.gov.uk/
- Residents who need help with emergency living expenses for food, fuel (gas and electric for customers who pay via a key meter), travel expenses and household appliances and/or clothing in exceptional circumstances can apply for help from our Hardship Fund (Individual Assistance Payment) at www.lbbd.gov.uk/hardship-and-covid-support-schemes.

Growth ambition welcome but funding and more detail needed

On Friday, 23 September the Chancellor of the Exchequer Kwasi Kwarteng made a statement to the House of Commons setting out the government's Growth Plan.

London Councils has warned that fast-rising costs and demand for services mean boroughs in the capital need to make £400 million of savings this year, which could rise to £700 million next year without an uplift in funding closer to the rate of inflation.

London Councils Chair Cllr Georgia Gould said: "Councils are already providing a safety net to communities and doing all they can to support people who are struggling. Financial support from the government for councils is crucial for continuing this work. Boroughs stand ready to work with the government to find long-term solutions to support our residents and businesses in the capital."
