
## Members' Briefing





### Leader's borough update

## Council launches landmark Inclusive Growth Strategy consultation

The Council is keen to hear residents' views and opinions on its draft Inclusive Growth Strategy – our plan for people and places as the borough continues to grow.

The draft strategy sets out the council's vision for growth in the short and medium term and how it will support residents throughout.

Residents are being invited to attend <u>a virtual event on Monday 24 October</u> between 12.30 to 1.30pm which will give them an overview of the draft strategy and include a Q&A session. <u>A survey asking for residents' views on the</u> strategy has also been released and will close on 7 November.

Ahead of major developments taking place in the borough, including the relocation of London's iconic three food markets and the Eastbrook Film Studios, the council has set forward its proposed strategy to ensure that all its residents and businesses benefit from the growth and investment being put into the borough.

Residents are at the heart of the new strategy, and we want to hear their concerns and suggestions about all of the current and upcoming developments.

The Inclusive Growth strategy sets out four key themes that will be focused on, to ensure the borough's development will work for all. The four themes are:

**Theme 1**: A thriving and inclusive economy

**Theme 2**: Creating places we are proud of

Theme 3: Homes for everyone

**Theme 4**: A Net Zero cleaner greener borough

Within each theme are key council targets such as: tackling climate change, improving local business space and support, improving housing for vulnerable people, lowering anti-social behaviour and much more.

Residents are encouraged to look out for further events in the coming months where they will be able to give further input into the shape of the borough's development.



#### Borough says NO to youth violence

The council launched a new phase of its Lost Hours campaign as part of its commitment to tackling youth violence on Thursday 29 September.

The event was hosted at Dagenham Park CofE School, where students and their parents found out more about the campaign and had the opportunity to

talk to local organisations and providers about all the great stuff that's available. Over the next couple of months, we'll be working with schools and asking parents to take responsibility for their children and get them into something positive.

We want parents to be asking their children and young people:

- Who are they hanging around with?
- Who they are speaking to on the phone?
- Where do they go with their friends?



# Local groups invited to apply for a share of £10,000 for equality and diversity projects

Local community groups are being encouraged to help spend a £10,000 pot of money to help promote social inclusion, celebrate diversity, and support equality across the borough.

The Equality and Diversity Community Fund offers charities and groups the chance to apply for up to £500 for initiatives that provide opportunities for people with protected characteristics.

The next round of funding will be open to any equalities event. In this window of funding, we're particularly encouraging applications for any Independence Day celebrations or flag raisings, as well as International Day of Persons with Disabilities (3 December), Christmas (December), LGBT+ History Month (February), Race Equality Week (February), or Women's Empowerment Month (March).

There are three application windows throughout the year for the fund. The second opportunity for groups opened on 1 October and will close on Monday 31 October.

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# Parents are being reminded to apply for their child's secondary school place

Parents whose children are in Year 6 are being reminded to submit their secondary school application. They have until Monday 31 October to get their applications in to give their child the best chance of being accepted into their first-choice school.

# Help and support available for residents through the Household Support Scheme

Residents who may be struggling with their finances or to make ends meet are being encouraged to get in touch.

Funding is available to vulnerable residents to support them with essentials over the coming months.

There are also a number of other support services including:

- Our Community Food Clubs which are free of charge and can provide £20 worth of food per week for a period of either three or six months at www.lbbd.gov.uk/community-food-clubs
- Our money and debt webpages provide an income and expenditure calculator and budgeting tools that will help people understand how much money they have coming in and how much is going out, helping them look at areas where they can make savings at www.lbbd.gov.uk/money-and-debt

- People struggling with increasing energy costs should contact their energy supplier about possible funds they may be entitled to, to help them through difficult periods. - People with disabilities who aren't claiming specific disability benefits
  may be able to take advantage of a number of benefits available,
  including Personal Independence Payments, Disability Living Allowance

  disabilities they may be able to claim Carer's Allowance although this is

- People with a water meter who are experiencing financial difficulties may

#### London boroughs launch new HIV prevention campaign

Do it London have launched their latest HIV prevention campaign on behalf of all London boroughs.

The 'Be Sure. Know the Four' campaign launched last Monday 10 October and will run through the autumn period, including World Aids Day (1 December), ending on 12 December.

London has demonstrated encouraging progress in reducing new HIV diagnosis in recent years. In 2021, new HIV diagnoses fell by 7%. Looking further back, between 2015 and 2021 new diagnoses fell by 66%. However, HIV remains an important public health challenge in London and the danger of complacency could threaten to reverse this trend.

Cllr Nesir Caliskan, London Councils' Executive Member for Health and Care, said: "When boroughs come together and collaborate to tackle key public health challenges, we have been able to see real change across our city. HIV is no exception, which is why we continue to champion HIV prevention through this targeted joint campaign."

The LGA are offering councillors the opportunity to have one-to-one development conversations with one of the Leadership Academy Facilitators. This will be available to councillors in leadership positions for the next three months. These sessions are not political and will be provided by tutors from the LGA's Leadership Academy programme who a number of councillors might have met from participation on the programmes. They will be focussed on helping councillors adapt their personal leadership style through three structured coaching calls.
