Leader's borough update

In his video this week, the Leader mentions the financial challenges residents are facing due to the cost of living crisis and shares a few hints to help cut down on energy use and save money.

He reminds residents about the borough's warm spaces and the help and support available from the council and its partners to help people through the cost of living crisis.

And he finishes by reminding residents that nominations are still open for the 2023 Women's Empowerment Awards which celebrate the achievements of

women who live and work in Barking and Dagenham.



Residents are invited to have their say on the 2023/24 council budget proposals

Residents are being encouraged to give their views on <u>Barking and Dagenham</u> <u>Council's 2023/24 budget proposals.</u>

The plans have been announced against a backdrop of severe and sustained cuts to local government, which have seen the council's funding slashed from £103m in 2010 to £80m in 2022 - taking into account inflation of over 40% during this time, funding given to the council is the equivalent of just £57m compared to £103m in 2010.

We are supporting residents through the biggest cost of living crisis in almost

half a century and the impact of spiralling inflation has driven up the costs of everyday essentials and is causing a big squeeze on an already stretched budget.

In response to the latest crisis, the council launched a network of community hubs to offer help and advice in neighbourhoods across the borough, as well as partnering with community organisations to create a Cost of Living Alliance to support people as early as possible, including providing help with energy costs, money worries, food and wellbeing.

A number of warm hubs have also been established to support residents who are struggling with their energy bills by providing a warm space for them to go to during the day.

Over the last few years, the council has faced major challenges across all of our services, particularly housing and social care. For every £10 we spend, £7 goes on caring for the most vulnerable people in our community before we can fund anything else and demand on our services continues to rise. The budget proposals acknowledge that despite making £50million in savings and efficiencies over the last five years, more help is needed from the government if we are to continue to balance the books.

To continue to provide key services for our most vulnerable residents, we are proposing a 5 per cent increase in Council Tax, including 2 per cent ringfenced for social care, which will add around £1.33 per week onto the average band D property (excluding the GLA element) from next April. The cost of delivering the council's services have been affected by inflation which has increased by 10.1% over the past year.

Residents will now need photo ID to vote in elections from May 2023

The Electoral Law is changing and from May this year, residents will need to show some form of photo ID to vote in local and general elections.

Many residents may lose their chance to vote if they are not aware of the change or if they do not have an approved form of photo ID.

Residents must make sure they are registered to vote. Here's a full list of approved forms of photo ID:

- ✓ A United Kingdom passport
- ✓ A passport issued by an EEA state or a Commonwealth country
- ✓ A national identity card issued by an EEA state
- ✓ A UK driving licence
- ✓ A driving licence issued by the Channel Islands, the Isle of Man or an EEA state
- ✓ A Biometric Immigration Document
- ✓ PASS card issued by the National Proof of Age Standards scheme bearing the Proof of Age Standards Scheme hologram
- ✓ A Ministry of Defence Form 90 (Defence Identity Card)
- ✓ A Blue Badge
- ✓ Concessionary travel passes funded by the UK Government: Older Person's Bus Pass, Disabled Person's Bus Pass, Oyster 60+ Card, Freedom Pass
- X A student Oyster ID card will not be accepted!

Residents who don't have any of the photo IDs above must apply for a free Voter Authority Certificate on the <u>GOV.UK</u> website to be able to vote. They can find out more information and register to vote at <u>www.gov.uk/register-to-vote</u>.

Funding available for local community and voluntary organisations to help reduce crime

The Council is calling on community and voluntary organisations to apply for funding to help with work to reduce crime and improve community safety in the borough.

The Mayor of Policing and Crime (MOPAC) provides the London Crime Prevention Fund (LCPF) to councils to commission services and interventions to support crime reduction. The council has allocated funding for the community and voluntary sector to apply for as long as they offer services to meet the Community Safety Partnership (CSP) priorities, which include:

- 1. Keeping children and young people safe
- 2. Reducing reoffending
- 3. Standing up to hate crime, intolerance and extremism

- 4. Tackling crimes that affect people the most
- 5. Tackling violence against women and girls

The council would like applications to focus on support for victims, perceptions of safety and reduction of violence.

The council now has a Community Safety Enforcement Team that focuses on areas that have been highlighted as hot spots for antisocial behaviour and they patrol them seven days a week.

In recent years, we have run several initiatives to reduce youth violence in the borough, including our <u>Lost Hours</u> campaign which urges parents to take more responsibility for their children as well as work the council is doing to reduce antisocial behaviour and crime in the borough.

Organisations have until Monday 20 February to submit their applications and can apply on the <u>council's consultation portal</u>.

Help and support available for residents through the Household Support Scheme

Funding is available to vulnerable residents to support them with essentials over the coming months.

Local Government News

Local welfare services play a vital role supporting struggling residents

Local welfare services provided by local councils provide a vital safety net to households in financial crisis and should receive long-term government funding, a new study concludes.

London Councils commissioned analysts at <u>Policy in Practice</u> to carry out the first ever in-depth evaluation of Local Welfare Assistance (LWA) schemes across the capital.

The research found that a wide range of events can cause financial crisis and trigger an application for financial assistance, including domestic abuse, flooding of homes, redundancy, and bereavement. Many applicants had experienced delays in receiving benefits payments, suggesting delivery problems in the national benefits system are a factor driving demand for local welfare support.

Concluding that councils are best placed to provide such emergency support to residents, the researchers recommend that central government re-establishes

ring-fenced, long-term funding for local authorities' LWA schemes. The government abolished direct funding for LWA from 2015/16, leaving local authorities to decide whether to maintain an LWA service paid for via their general funds.

London Councils' Executive Member for Communities, Cllr Claire Holland, said: "As this research shows, councils' local welfare services provide a vital safety net. We're often our residents' last hope and a bulwark against homelessness and despair. Boroughs believe the money invested in this support pays real dividends, not only by assisting those in crisis but also through avoiding additional costs to the wider public sector."

New Year Honours

A number of London local government figures were recognised in the 2023
New Year Honours list, including former Chair of the City of London Policy and Resources Committee and London Councils Vice Chair, Catherine
McGuinness, who was awarded a CBE for services to the financial sector and educational inclusion.

Others recognised in the awards include: Former Hounslow Leader **Stephen Curran**, who received a CBE for services to local government; former Brent Deputy Leader **Margaret McLennan**, who received an MBE for services to digital inclusion and to the community in Brent; Head of Culture and Place, Royal Borough of Kensington and Chelsea, **Verena Cornwall**, who received an MBE for services to local government and to the community in Kensington and Chelsea; and **Jahran Allen-Thompson**, Mortuary Service Manager at the London Borough of Waltham Forest, who received an MBE for services to local government.
