## **Great news for Dagenham Heathway**

The borough has secured £10.8m funding for two new projects that will reinvigorate Dagenham Heathway, thanks to a bid written by Be First on the council's behalf, as part of the latest awards announced through the Government's Levelling Up Fund.

The funding will be allocated to the remediation and demolition of Millard

Terrace, making the wider redevelopment of the area more financially viable. It will also facilitate a development which will generate 316 new homes, new commercial units and public realm and streetscape improvements, and safeguard 241 jobs.

To bring forward redevelopment of Millard Terrace a ballot of residents will be required. Since the bid was submitted a 'Test of Opinion' was taken and 75% of tenants were in favour of redevelopment.

## Residents urged to go greener with the Green Garden Waste collection service

Residents are being urged to add some green plans to their New Year resolutions and do their bit for the planet while making their lives easier, by

signing up to the council's Green Garden Waste collection service.

The service, which costs £43 for the year, collects and recycles flowers, weeds, leaves, grass cuttings, twigs and hedge trimmings.

Launched in 2017, the service saw over 7,500 residents sign up last year.

Residents can now take advantage of 19 fortnightly collections between March and December if they sign up before Valentine's Day, Tuesday 14 February.

The Green Garden Waste service has proved a significant part of the council's efforts to meet the Mayor of London's target of having a 50 per cent recycling rate by 2030.

## Residents are invited to have their say on the 2023/24 council budget proposals

Residents are being encouraged to give their views on <u>Barking and Dagenham</u> Council's 2023/24 budget proposals.

The plans have been announced against a backdrop of severe and sustained cuts to local government, which have seen the council's funding slashed from £103m in 2010 to £80m in 2022. Taking into account inflation of over 40% during this time, funding given to the council is the equivalent of just £57m compared to £103m in 2010.

We are supporting residents through the biggest cost of living crisis in almost half a century and the impact of spiralling inflation has driven up the costs of everyday essentials and is causing a big squeeze on an already stretched budget.

In response to the latest crisis, the council launched a network of community hubs to offer help and advice in neighbourhoods across the borough. We have also partnered with community organisations to create a <u>Cost of Living Alliance</u> to support people as early as possible, including providing help with energy costs, money worries, food and wellbeing.

A number of warm hubs have also been established to support residents who are struggling with their energy bills by providing a warm space for them to go to during the day.

Over the last few years, the council has faced major challenges across all of our services, particularly housing and social care. For every £10 we spend, £7 goes on caring for the most vulnerable people in our community before we can fund anything else and demand on our services continues to rise. The budget proposals acknowledge that despite making £50million in savings and efficiencies over the last five years, more help is needed from the government if we are to continue to balance the books.

To continue to provide key services for our most vulnerable residents, we are proposing a 5 per cent increase in Council Tax, including 2 per cent ringfenced for social care, which will add around £1.33 per week onto the average band D property (excluding the GLA element) from next April. The cost of delivering the council's services have been affected by inflation which has increased by 10.1% over the past year.

### Giving residents a helping hand through the cost of living crisis


We've been sharing lots of ways residents can get help with money, food, energy, wellbeing and more.

Funding is available to vulnerable residents to support them with essentials over the coming months.

- Our money and debt webpages provide an income and expenditure calculator and budgeting tools that will help people understand how much money they have coming in and how much is going out, helping them look at areas where they can make savings at www.lbbd.gov.uk/money-and-debt

### Drop in Primary School demand will impact on schools' budgets

London's declining birth rate is impacting on schools' budgets across the capital, a new report published by London Councils has revealed. The majority of school revenue funding is allocated on a per pupil basis and a decrease in pupil numbers means a decrease in the funding a school receives. With many primary schools in London already struggling to balance budgets due to a combination of factors, including inflationary price increases, and a shortage of teaching and support staff, schools will have to make further difficult decisions to balance their budgets.

<u>London Councils' Executive Member for Children and Young People, Cllr Ian</u>
<u>Edwards</u>, said: "London boroughs are working closely with schools

experiencing decreasing demand for school places to achieve the best for young Londoners. London still has the best performing schools in the country, and it is vital we ensure our schools thrive in this difficult climate and, most importantly, that children achieve the best outcomes.

"London Councils will work closely with key education partners in London, including government, to mitigate the impact of this drop in demand for school places and to establish an effective framework to meet this challenge going forwards."

#### Net Zero review published

On Friday 13 January, the Department for Business, Energy & Industrial Strategy <u>published the findings of the Net Zero Review</u>, chaired by former Energy Minister Chris Skidmore MP.

His final report, Mission Zero, makes more than one hundred recommendations – covering areas including the role that business can play and delivering more energy efficient homes – to maximise economic investment, opportunities and jobs, while working towards achieving legally binding targets to reach net zero carbon emissions by 2050.

Responding to the report's findings, <u>London Councils' Executive Member for Climate Change, Transport and Environment, Mayor Philip Glanville</u>, said: "(The) Net Zero Review confirms that in order to create a sustainable, effective transition to tackle climate change, local authorities must be at the core (and) it is positive to see our representations reflected in the report.

"The report highlights the number of barriers we face in delivering net zero targets. These include the complexity of government funding programmes and the lack of long-term certainty for funding, which has a knock-on effect on local places' ability to strategically plan and deliver projects efficiently. "We welcome the acknowledgement of these challenges, particularly the

recommendation for central government to simplify the net zero funding landscape for all local authorities by the next Spending Review.

"We stand ready to work with government and other partners to achieve a successful, placed-based transition to net zero that develops green jobs for the future."

### **Fast Track City**

Last week marked the five year anniversary since London became a <u>'fast track city'</u>, by signing up to the Paris Declaration on Fast Track Cities Ending the Aids Epidemic.

The agreement, signed by the Mayor of London, London Councils, Public Health England and NHS England, commits London to end new HIV infections, stop preventable HIV deaths and eliminate the discrimination and stigma associated with HIV by 2030.

The <u>London HIV Prevention Programme</u> (LHPP) and the public facing information campaign <u>Do It London</u> has played a key role in London's ambitions to achieve the fast track cities goal.
