


Leader's borough update

Council welcomes plans for new Community Diagnostic Centre

The council's planning committee voted unanimously in favour of plans for a new Community Diagnostic Centre (CDC) to be built at Barking Community

Hospital.

Plans for the new £14.9 million CDC were heard at a meeting of the Planning Committee on Monday 13 February.

The decision is an important milestone for getting the project completed, with the Barking, Havering and Redbridge Hospitals Trust (BHRUT) hoping the new CDC will begin welcoming patients in December this year.

Councillors heard how the proposed development would dramatically reduce the time needed for residents to travel to vital screenings and health tests. They also heard how the plans were informed by BHRUT speaking to residents and finding out what is important for them.

Officers and councillors were strongly supportive of the scheme and the significant health benefits for the borough.

We hope that the legal agreement will be finalised over the coming weeks, which will leave the developer free to commence works on site and begin development of the new facility.

Over the past months, Barking Hospital has hosted mobile CT and MRI scanners, ultrasound facilities and X-ray machines, which have reduced waiting lists and ensured that residents have access to the care they need.

The proposed CDC will house MRI, CT and ultrasound scanners and have suitable waiting, changing and other public facilities. It will also restore car parking spaces at the hospital, which are currently being taken up by the temporary diagnostic units.



Council launches scheme to help address antisocial behaviour

Last week, the council launched an initiative to bring residents, Councillors and officers together to combat antisocial behaviour concerns across the borough.

The scheme, known as Ward Walkabout, kicked off in Chadwell Heath Ward on

Thursday 9 February when Community Safety Enforcement officers joined Cllrs Simon Perry and Michael Pongo on a walk around of the local area.

During the walk, both councillors raised issues on behalf of residents, including concerns about fly-tipping and damage to communal areas.

During the walk about, officers issued one Fixed Penalty Notice for spitting and two vehicles were reported to the DVLA for not having an MOT. Issues raised will be escalated to the relevant services in the council to resolve.

Giving residents a helping hand through the cost of living crisis


We've been sharing lots of ways residents can get help with money, food, energy, wellbeing and more.

- People struggling with increasing energy costs should contact their energy supplier about possible funds they may be entitled to, to help them through difficult periods. They can also access the Warm Homes Grant at www.gov.uk/the-warm-home-discount-scheme
- People with disabilities who aren't claiming specific disability benefits
 may be able to take advantage of a number of benefits available,
 including Personal Independence Payments, Disability Living Allowance
 (for children), and Universal Credit. For those caring for someone with
 disabilities they may be able to claim Carer's Allowance although this is

- People with a water meter who are experiencing financial difficulties may
 want to look into the Watersure scheme at
 www.ofwat.gov.uk/households/customer-assistance. Most water
 companies also have a fund to help those who are struggling, and it
 might be worth contacting their water provider.
- People who are out of work and looking to get into employment can get help and support from our Job Shops at www.lbbd.gov.uk/help-finding-work

Local Government News

We need more protection for private renters and more affordable homes

London Councils has welcomed a new parliamentary report on reforming the private rented sector, reiterating boroughs' support for stronger tenant protections and more affordable housing.

The report from the <u>Levelling Up</u>, <u>Housing</u>, <u>and Communities Committee</u> points to the precarious state of local government finances, the shortage of qualified enforcement staff, and a lack of reliable data. The report also highlights the need for more affordable housing to tackle the rocketing rental costs many tenants face.

London Councils, which gave evidence to the committee's, inquiry, is urging ministers to prioritise the report's recommendations.

<u>London Councils' Executive Member for Regeneration, Housing & Planning,</u>
Cllr Darren Rodwell, said: "Two million Londoners live in private rented sector

homes and they all deserve stronger protection. In the face of an ongoing costof-living crisis, the issue is as urgent as ever.

"As the report makes clear, councils will also need strong enforcement powers and new resources to help ensure any changes in the law succeed in helping tenants and improving standards in the private rented sector.

"There is a chronic shortage of affordable housing in the capital. Ultimately, we need a massive expansion in the delivery of new affordable homes to relieve the pressures across the entire housing system."

Children's Summit

The Association of London Directors of Children's Services and their sector-led improvement partnership LIIA (London Innovation and Improvement Alliance) hosted their annual children's summit at the Guildhall in the City of London last week.

The summit, chaired by London Councils Executive Lead for Schools and Children's Services, Cllr Ian Edwards, was attended by over 160 delegates comprising a wide variety of London-wide senior figures from children and young people's services. Also in attendance was the Permanent Secretary from the Department for Education Susan Acland-Hood who, in addition to a prerecorded address from Claire Coutinho Minister for Children, Families and Wellbeing, shared some of the findings from the recently published Care Review Implementation Consultation.

The Pan-London Data Sharing Agreements Project, led by the London Office of Technology and Innovation (LOTI), aims to tackle barriers to effective data sharing, to provide clarity to professionals and promote a shared understanding of when and how information should be shared.

The LGA has commissioned the Zero Carbon Britain team at the Centre for Alternative Technology (CAT) to undertake an exciting project to develop draft route maps for councils across England to understand how to embed sustainability across some service areas, through an Innovation Lab.

The lab consisted of a series of workshops bringing together voices from across councils to contribute expertise in how service areas and operations work in reality. Participants were from all levels, from officers to senior management and CEOs. This approach enables a whole system understanding of councils to inform the outputs of the lab.

In this webinar, funded by Government, we will be hearing from the CAT team, as well as some of the lab's participants, about how they found the experience and what the next steps are for the project. There will also be ample time for questions and feedback from attendees.

One to One Development Sessions

The LGA are offering councillors the opportunity to have one-to-one development conversations with one of the Leadership Academy Facilitators. This will be available to councillors in leadership positions for the next three months. These sessions are not political and will be provided by tutors from the LGA's Leadership Academy programme who a number of councillors might have met from participation on the programmes. They will be focussed on helping councillors adapt their personal leadership style through three structured coaching calls.
