Children learn about virtual production techniques at Film LBBD event

Over 700 school children were taught virtual production skills and other aspects of film production by industry professionals during an interactive event, organised by Film Barking and Dagenham and Inspiring Futures (Barking & Dagenham Cultural Education Partnership).

Eye-catching displays, including a giant virtual production wall (LED screen), were some of the technologies demonstrated in real time to the youngsters.

The children also met industry practitioners from film-related businesses including lighting, postproduction, media make-up, and casting. Local businesses on hand to lend their expertise on the day include: Borthwick Casting, Bluebird Pictures, Final Checks Academy and Location 1.

The idea was to give the children an insight into the vast number of career paths available to them in this burgeoning industry.

The children also found out about local opportunities to train to work in film and TV, courtesy of the East London Institute of Technology at Barking & Dagenham College.

At the end of the day, parents were invited into a drop-in session where they took part in a careers Q&A with the industry professionals.

Funding is available to vulnerable residents to support them with essentials over the coming months.

- People struggling with increasing energy costs should contact their energy supplier about possible funds they may be entitled to, to help them through difficult periods. They can also access the Warm Homes Grant at www.gov.uk/the-warm-home-discount-scheme
- People with disabilities who aren't claiming specific disability benefits
 may be able to take advantage of a number of benefits available,
 including Personal Independence Payments, Disability Living Allowance
 (for children), and Universal Credit. For those caring for someone with
 disabilities they may be able to claim Carer's Allowance although this is
 means tested, at www.gov.uk/financial-help-disabled/disability-and-sickness-benefits
- People with a water meter who are experiencing financial difficulties may
 want to look into the Watersure scheme at
 www.ofwat.gov.uk/households/customer-assistance. Most water
 companies also have a fund to help those who are struggling, and it
 might be worth contacting their water provider.

Apprenticeship Opportunities

At a time when increasing the number of apprenticeships is urgently needed to address both youth unemployment and London's skills gap, London Councils is bringing together London Leaders and Chief Executives as part of a collective action to boost recruitment of young and diverse apprentices.

Nationally, the number of under-19s starting apprenticeships fell by 53,900 between 2016 and 2022 (41%), while the number of 19–24 year-olds starting apprenticeships decreased by 47,530 (31%) over the same time. Boroughs are determined to play their part in helping to reverse this decline.

At a London Councils Apprenticeship Summit last week, Council Leaders and Chief Executives came together to showcase best practice in creating more apprenticeships, including the benefits they will bring to communities locally through wide-ranging recruitment opportunities.

London Councils' Executive Member for Skills and Employment, Mayor

Rokhsana Fiaz, said: "Apprenticeships open up amazing opportunities to Londoners from diverse communities and walks of life.

"Local leaders across the capital are taking action to shift the dial so that we boost the number of young Londoners starting apprenticeships with London boroughs and our supply chains. Through greater collaboration, we hope to overcome the obstacles in our path and see the many rewards that come with investing in our young people."

One of the many challenges boroughs face is the inflexibility of the apprenticeship levy. Mayor Fiaz said: "It is imperative that more is done to make it easier for employers to hire apprentices and help them realise their potential as they enter the workforce. There is growing evidence that government must work with employers to overhaul the apprenticeship levy so that more of it can be invested in upskilling Londoners for the jobs of today and tomorrow."

LGC Awards shortlist announced

The Association of London Directors of Children's Services sector-led improvement partnership, the London Innovation and Improvement Alliance (LIIA), which is hosted at London Councils, has been shortlisted for an award in the Innovation category at this year's LGC Awards.

Since its formation in 2019 the LIIA has taken forward an ambitious programme of work that addresses London's collective challenges, including the Your Choice adolescent safeguarding programme and the London pledge, to help boroughs address rising costs associated with the agency social worker market.

Greenwich and Westminster (Housing); Lewisham and Tower Hamlets (Innovation); Hackney, Hammersmith & Fulham, Waltham Forest and Westminster (Large Team of the Year); Southwark (Small Team of the Year); Lewisham (Most Improved Council); Barnet and Newham (Public Health); Greenwich and Hackney (Private/Public Partnership); Enfield (Public/Public Partnership); Westminster (Technology).

The LGA has commissioned the Zero Carbon Britain team at the Centre for Alternative Technology (CAT) to undertake an exciting project to develop draft route maps for councils across England to understand how to embed sustainability across some service areas, through an Innovation Lab.

The lab consisted of a series of workshops bringing together voices from across councils to contribute expertise in how service areas and operations work in reality. Participants were from all levels, from officers to senior management and CEOs. This approach enables a whole system understanding of councils to inform the outputs of the lab.

In this webinar, funded by Government, we will be hearing from the CAT team, as well as some of the lab's participants, about how they found the experience and what the next steps are for the project. There will also be ample time for questions and feedback from attendees.

Annual Public Health Conference 2023 - Tuesday 21 March to Thursday 23 March 2023, 9.30am to 1pm

This key annual public health conference will offer delegates the opportunity to hear from leading experts on the very latest thinking in national public health policy issues, as well as gaining insights from those delivering on the ground. It will provide a much-needed opportunity for the public health community to come together, share learning, take stock and plan for the future.

Over three half-day virtual sessions, delegates will be able to put their questions and comments to a line-up of speakers and will have the opportunity to participate in sessions sharing good practice from local areas and to discuss issues that matter to them.
