### Leader's borough update

In his video this week, the Leader talks about the flag raising to launch our ninth annual Women's Empowerment Month and all the programme of activities celebrating the fantastic contribution women and girls make to the borough.

The Leader also mentions the budget for the coming year which protects services, with more money for social care, and spending more on improving people's homes and keeping our streets clean.

He ends with a mention of the difficult decision to raise Council Tax and

reminds residents who are struggling through the cost of living crisis to visit our Community Hubs where they can get help with money, energy, food and advice about looking after themselves.



# Council agrees finances for 2023/24

Measures to protect services, extra support for people struggling with the cost of living crisis, more money to provide social care, further spending on improving residents' homes and keeping the streets clean were agreed in the council's 2023/24 budget.

The financial plans, approved on Wednesday 1 March, outline how residents on a low income could be eligible to pay just 15% of their total Council Tax bill – the figure had previously been 25%.

Other help includes an extra £500,000 to be added to the council's hardship fund as a way of supporting people most affected by the rising cost of living, and a commitment to keep rent and service charge rises below inflation.

The new measures follow the launch of eight community hubs across the borough, designed to bring a range of vital support and council services to residents' doorsteps as well as continuing to invest in improvements to online services which residents can access at any time.

The 2023/24 budget doesn't include cuts to services as the council continues to protect the services residents need.

As part of the budget announcement, Council Tax will increase by 4.99% (excluding the GLA element) - 2.99% towards the general fund and 2% ringfenced for the adult social care precept. This works out as an additional £69.33 for the year – around 19p a day – on a Band D property.

# Borough again top in London for awarding young people first preference school

Over three quarters of young people in the borough will attend their first preference secondary school from September.

Figures released on National Offer Day, last Wednesday 1 March, show that out of 3,409 applications, 2,784 (81.67%) of 10 and 11 - year-olds have were offered their first preference, far exceeding the London average of 69.78% and outperforming every other borough in the capital.

This is the second consecutive year that Barking and Dagenham has come out top in London.

The borough also performed above the London-wide average for top three preferences. 94% of applicants received an offer on a school in their top three, compared to 89% London-wide.

Overall, 96% of applicants in the borough were offered one of their preferences compared with the London average of 94%.



# How well do you know your borough?

We previously shared the 2021 census data for the borough with you on subjects such as age, country of birth, ethnicity, household size, living arrangements, migration and religion.

The Office for National Statistics (ONS) has now released more data and you can now find out how life has changed between the last two censuses (2011 and 2021) for people living in the borough in terms of disability, health, housing, unpaid care and working hours. #### London stands with Ukraine

Friday 24 February was the anniversary of the launch of the full-scale invasion of Ukraine by Russia. To mark the anniversary and reiterate their unwavering support for the people of Ukraine, London Councils Chair Cllr Georgia Gould, and Vice Chairs Baroness O'Neil of Bexley OBE; Cllr Ruth Dombey OBE; and Deputy Chris Hayward, issued <u>a joint statement</u>:

"One year on from the start of the Russian invasion of Ukraine, we mourn the lives lost and communities torn apart by this brutal war.

"We pledge to continue showing our support by opening our homes, our schools and our hearts to Ukrainians arriving in the capital."

Using data to better understand rough sleeping in London

The London Office of Technology and Innovation (LOTI) is exploring ways that data can be better used to help London boroughs tackle rough sleeping by identifying pathways into and out of homelessness and addressing 'blind spots' in understanding rough sleeping.

LOTI is working with London Councils, the Greater London Authority and Bloomberg Associates to develop and deliver a data tool that can support the aims of the London Life Off the Streets Programme to make rough sleeping in the capital "rare, brief and non-recurring."

In this webinar, funded by Government, we will be hearing from the CAT team, as well as some of the lab's participants, about how they found the experience and what the next steps are for the project. There will also be ample time for questions and feedback from attendees.

This key annual public health conference will offer delegates the opportunity to hear from leading experts on the very latest thinking in national public health policy issues, as well as gaining insights from those delivering on the ground.
