Leader's borough update

In his video this week, the Leader invites residents to keep the weekend of 6 and 7 May free, so they can join in the FREE Summer of Festivals Weekender which takes place in Valence Park.

On Saturday 6 May, the council will host a special Coronation Day event in honour of His Majesty The King and Her Majesty The Queen Consort, where we will broadcast the coronation ceremony on a big screen with entertainment throughout the day.

On Sunday 7 May, the council will host the One Borough Festival, which will bring together the Steam and Cider Fair and the Roundhouse Music Festival.

He ends by sharing news of the £800k funding for Valence House Museum and the Thames Freeport getting the green light from government – a move which will generate over £4.6bn investment and create 21,000 jobs for us and neighbouring boroughs.



Thames Freeport given green light

The Thames Freeport has been given the go ahead to formally constitute its board and start operating fully, following the approval of the final business case by the UK government.

The Freeport is an economic zone located in the Thames Estuary and the UK's largest port - the Port of London. With 1,700 acres of development land, no location can match Thames Freeport for access to Europe's largest consumer

market and its excellent connectivity to 18 million people.

A partnership between Ford, Forth Ports Limited and DP World, Thames Freeport will see over £4.6 billion in new public and private investment, and the creation of over 21,000 new jobs and many more across supply chains. Significant investment in training and skills will contribute to the 'levelling-up' of the communities and businesses in East London and South Essex.

The Freeport has already started to deliver new business growth, generating over 500 new jobs, with six businesses joining its sites that offer a package of financial incentives. This announcement reinforces the great work that is already in place to boost the speed of investment, through a comprehensive Trade and Investment Programme with international partnerships to boost global trade. It also recognises Thames Freeport as a centre of innovation, decarbonised fuels, smart technology, and light freight on the river Thames – setting a standard for a green, net zero freeport of the future.

To strengthen the board of the Thames Freeport, three Non-Executive Directors have been appointed to provide strong leadership, governance, and private and public expertise to make Thames Freeport a place where businesses thrive.



We're investing in Barking Station

Barking is one of the top 20 busiest stations in the country and a lot is about to change there.

The improvements include a new gate further away from the stairs, toilets on platform 1, new shops, the old clock, kiosks on the platform re-opening for business and solar panels to power the station with green energy.

These are just some of the changes that commuters will see over the coming months, thanks to a £9m investment from the Railway Heritage Fund, c2c, Department for Transport and the council.

The first phase of a three-stage plan of improvements at the station is due to be completed by September 2023.

£800K plus funding secured for Valence House Museum

Over £800K in funding has been secured to give Valence House Museum some much needed renovations.

The well-loved museum received the funding from the Department for Culture, Media and Sport as part of their Cultural Investment Fund.

The money will go into renovating the green spaces around the museum as well as going into restoring the historic moat.



National Emergency Alert system goes LIVE

The government's new Emergency Alerts system is now live. The system will enable people to be contacted via their mobile phone when lives are in danger.

It will be used to warn people in the event of emergencies, such as severe flooding.

Emergency Alerts are sent to all compatible mobile phones within an area of

risk. They don't track a person's location, need their phone number, or collect personal data. Only the government and the emergency services will be able to send them. If people don't have a mobile phone, they'll still be kept informed through other channels.

If anyone gets an Emergency Alert on their phone, they'll hear a loud, siren-like sound. A message on their screen will tell them about the emergency and how best to respond.

They'll be able to check an alert is genuine at www.gov.uk/alerts. If they receive an alert, they should read the alert carefully and follow the instructions. They can also opt out if they want to.

London Leaders stand ready to work with the Met to rebuild trust

Baroness Casey's <u>independent review</u> into the standards of behaviour and internal culture of the Metropolitan Police Service, published last week, has found the force to be institutionally racist, misogynistic and homophobic.

The year-long review, commissioned in response to grave levels of public concern following the kidnap, rape and murder of Sarah Everard by a serving Met officer and other troubling incidents, is described by Baroness Casey as: "Rigorous, stark and unsparing."

"Its findings are tough and for many will be difficult to take", she says. "But it should leave no one in any doubt about the scale of the challenge."

Responding to the review's findings, <u>London Councils Executive Member for Community Safety and Violence Against Women and Girls, Cllr Jas Athwal</u>, said: "The Casey Report is bleak and it sets out in black and white the Metropolitan Police Service's failings that unfortunately will resonate with too

many Londoners' experiences of the Met. It highlights the concerning experiences of women, young people and people from ethnic minorities in particular.

"A city as diverse as London needs a police force which reflects the communities it serves, and a police service which all Londoners feel they will be treated fairly by, irrespective of their gender, ethnicity, religion, sexuality or any other characteristic which is part of a person's identity.

"The swift and decisive action that Sir Mark Rowley has taken to cut out the rot within the service since he took office in the autumn must continue at pace. Local borough leaders met Sir Mark last week to discuss the impact of the Casey Report on the Metropolitan Police's Turnaround Plan.

"London leaders have a unique insight into the range of issues facing local communities, and we stand ready to work with the Met as it implements the significant changes needed to rebuild trust and confidence amongst London's diverse communities."

Boroughs call for 'more ambitious action' to tackle homelessness

London needs 'more ambitious action' to tackle its homelessness crisis. That was the verdict of London Councils following the Budget proposals set out by Chancellor Jeremy Hunt on 17 March.

Chair of London Councils, Cllr Georgia Gould, said: "We had hoped to see the Chancellor announce a rise in the Local Housing Allowance, which would go a long way to making housing more affordable for low-income Londoners. We also need much more support for building the affordable homes that our communities desperately need.

"Further devolution to the capital is vital. Boroughs would be in a much better position to tackle many of London's longstanding challenges if we could take the lead on policy decisions and direct resources for investing in services.

"Boroughs remain as committed as ever to working with the government on

these issues and in securing a fairer, more prosperous, and more sustainable future for London that delivers for our residents and for the UK economy."

Highlighting the worsening homelessness crisis in the capital, <u>new figures</u> published by London Councils have revealed that at least one child in every classroom in the capital is homeless.

A briefing summarising all the key policy announcements relating to public spending and local government finance announced in the Spring Budget was sent to London Councils members last week.

LOTI remit will evolve to embrace non-digital innovation too

The <u>London Office of Technology and Innovation</u> (LOTI) has said it is evolving to extend beyond technology and data to work with boroughs, the GLA and other partners on wider innovations.

In a <u>blog post</u> announcing the plans, LOTI Director Eddie Copeland says: "Tech and data are extremely powerful. They will play a key role in the responses to most big challenges. But they are rarely enough alone.

"It's therefore self-limiting for LOTI to deal with only those innovation methods associated with tech and data.

"If we're really to address London's big challenges, we must also embrace a wider set of non-digital innovation tools and methods that have huge potential in their own right and which can also augment what can be done with tech and data."

LOTI was founded as a membership organisation in July 2019 and is hosted by London Councils.
