Eastbury Manor House reopens its doors with a collection of free Easter events

Eastbury Manor House reopened its doors last Wednesday 5 April, following a period of closure over the Winter for repairs and maintenance.

Residents are now able to explore the heritage and history of the house, its gardens and café, and take advantage of a host of free, family friendly spring activities including:

- A series of Family Art Workshops throughout April including art and craft making sessions, spring themed pop-up collages suitable for ages 5yrs+ (up to 12yrs old). Children must be accompanied by a responsible adult.
- Free family trails self guided trails suitable for ages 5yrs+
- Free tours led by volunteers visitors can learn about the history and heritage of Eastbury Manor House and the people who lived there over the centuries.

The House, gardens, café and shop are open to the public Wednesday to Friday, from 10am to 4pm, and Sundays 11am to 4pm.

Council tops national planning performance tables

Barking and Dagenham has been ranked joint first in the country in the Department for Levelling Up, Housing and Communities (DLUHC) Planning

Performance Tables for on-time, non-major decisions. Every single non-major decision was made within eight weeks of the application being submitted.

We are one of three councils across the country to have achieved this feat.

The council also ranks joint first nationally for on-time major decisions, with every single major decision being made within the 13-week allocated period. Combined, this means that all planning applications submitted to the council are determined within the accepted timeframe. This means that developers who submit applications for large developments or individuals who submit applications for house extensions can be assured that the council will respond to their application in a timely manner.

Council delivers food hampers to 1,000 families over the Easter school break

The council teamed up with Growing Communities' Better Food Shed, a not-forprofit organic fruit and vegetable wholesaler, to deliver 1,000 food hampers to support some of our local families who need it the most.

The food hampers are being delivered to children attending the <u>Barking and Dagenham Holiday Activity and Food programme</u>, which is taking place in several locations across the borough during the Easter school break.

The activities are free for children and young people who are eligible for free school meals, and includes a healthy lunch – besides the food hampers packed with fresh, organic produce that the youngsters take home to their families.

Local volunteers helped BD Together and council staff pack up the hampers, which also included long shelf-life food items and a couple of easy and affordable recipes for families to try.

This project was piloted last Christmas, when 1,000 food hampers were delivered to children participating in the holiday activities provided over the winter school break.


On Sunday, from 1pm to 7pm, residents can enjoy the One Borough Festival, where we're mixing in old favourites like the Steam and Cider Fair and

Help and support available for residents through the Household Support Scheme

Residents who may be struggling with their finances or to make ends meet are being encouraged to get in touch.

Funding is available to vulnerable residents to support them with essentials over the coming months.

There are also a number of other support services including:

- Our Community Food Clubs which are free of charge and can provide £20 worth of food per week for a period of either three or six months at www.lbbd.gov.uk/community-food-clubs
- Our money and debt webpages provide an income and expenditure calculator and budgeting tools that will help people understand how much money they have coming in and how much is going out, helping them look at areas where they can make savings at www.lbbd.gov.uk/money-and-debt
- Residents who are worried about their finances and need help to tackle debt can now get advice and support from our local Barking and Dagenham Money website at: www.bdmoney.co.uk
- People struggling with increasing energy costs should contact their energy supplier about possible funds they may be entitled to, to help them through difficult periods. They can also access the Warm Homes Grant at www.gov.uk/the-warm-home-discount-scheme
- People with disabilities who aren't claiming specific disability benefits
 may be able to take advantage of a number of benefits available,
 including Personal Independence Payments, Disability Living Allowance
 (for children), and Universal Credit. For those caring for someone with
 disabilities they may be able to claim Carer's Allowance although this is

- People with a water meter who are experiencing financial difficulties may
 want to look into the Watersure scheme at

 companies also have a fund to help those who are struggling, and it
 might be worth contacting their water provider.

Local Government News

Right to But rules changes a 'shot in the arm' for council housing

London Councils has welcomed the new relaxation of restrictions on how local authorities use the money raised through Right to Buy sales.

The government has told councils they can retain 100% of Right to Buy receipts for 2022/23 and 2023/24. This marks a change from the previous rules on how local authorities could use the sales receipts, which saw much of the money returned to the Treasury rather than being available for building or buying replacement homes for homeless people in the community. The government has also declared a two-year freeze on capping the number of existing homes councils can purchase using Right to Buy receipts.

London Councils' Executive Member for Regeneration, Housing & Planning, Cllr Darren Rodwell, said: "These new flexibilities will provide a shot in the arm for borough's housing ambitions. We've long called for an end to all restrictions on how boroughs can use Right to Buy sales receipts. It is crucial that every penny raised from council house sales is available locally for replacing those

homes.

"In the face of London's worsening homelessness crisis, boroughs urgently need more resources for securing the affordable housing our communities are crying out for. The capital's housing pressures are the most severe in the country. This intervention is welcome, but we will continue to work with ministers to ensure boroughs get the long-term policy and funding support required for ending the homelessness crisis altogether."

Local government vital to unlocking investment and achieving net zero

The Department for Energy Security and Net Zero has published <u>Powering Up</u> <u>Britain</u>, setting out the government's policy plans to enhance energy security and deliver on our net zero commitments.

Responding to the plans, London Councils Executive Member for Climate Change, Transport and Environment Mayor Philip Glanville, said: "While it is positive to see that the 'Powering Up Britain' strategy recognises the key role that local government is already playing in the national shared mission to reach net zero, including our ability to unlock private investment, it is crucial local government is recognised as a vital strategic partner to allow us do more. "London boroughs have long been calling for simplification of the net zero funding landscape, a key recommendation in Chris Skidmore's Net Zero Review. We welcome the desire to address this barrier in today's response and stand ready to work with government to collaborate on an effective way to fund local net zero action at a fast pace. Local authorities also need a step change in the certainty and amount of funding that is available to speed up local net zero action.

"Climate change is happening now, and the impact is being felt by Londoners. Action to tackle it must be accelerated if we want to achieve our net zero goals, not just for some, but for all of London's diverse communities."

Ministerial meeting explores tech and digital collections for London

Technology and Innovation (LOTI) Director Eddie Copeland met with Minister for Tech and Digital Economy, and Minister for London, Paul Scully MP to discuss how boroughs are using innovation, data and technology for the benefit of their communities.

Biodiversity and nature recovery show and tell - Thursday 20 April, 10.30am to 12noon (Online)

As councils look to tackle their net zero targets, it is important to remember that there is an ecological crisis happening as well and responses to both are intrinsically linked. A key consideration of councils is looking to the Environment Act to see what is now required of them. Local Nature Recovery Strategies, Biodiversity Net Gain, protected sites and species are just a handful of new requirements that councils now need to act on.

In this webinar, funded by Government, we will hear from a range of councils about their approaches and experiences delivering biodiversity and nature recovery activities to date. These form part of a set of case studies showcasing approaches and experience drawn from across the country which will be launched at the event by the Planning Advisory Service.

Progress on children and young people's mental health policy in England Thursday 18 May, 2pm to 3.30pm (Online)

A range of policies such as the 2017 Transforming Children and Young People's Mental Health Green Paper, the NHS Long-Term Plan, and post COVID-19 recovery, have been announced regarding children's mental health in England over the past decade. However, the scale of children's mental health needs remains of real concern to councils, schools, families and young people themselves, particularly given the impact of the pandemic, school closures and the current cost of living crisis. Children's mental health has also been highlighted in recent announcements including the Family Hubs and Best Start for Life, Schools White Paper and Special Educational Needs Green Paper. The Government is currently developing a strategy for mental health (all-age).

The Centre for Mental Health and the Children and Young People Mental Health Coalition (CYPMHC) have been commissioned by the LGA to produce a report exploring these policy approaches, announcements and steps taken to tackle the rising demand in children's mental health. It looks at the progress that has been made and what else needs to happen to ensure that central government, local government, NHS and wider partners are able to tackle children's mental health needs in England. This webinar will explore the outcomes of this report.

One to One Development Sessions

The LGA are offering councillors the opportunity to have one-to-one development conversations with one of the Leadership Academy Facilitators. This will be available to councillors in leadership positions for the next three months. These sessions are not political and will be provided by tutors from the LGA's Leadership Academy programme who a number of councillors might have met from participation on the programmes. They will be focussed on helping councillors adapt their personal leadership style through three structured coaching calls.
