Leader's borough update

In his video this week, the Leader talks about the government's new emergency alerts system to warn people if there is danger to life, like a fire or extreme weather, which will be tested on Sunday 23 April at 3pm.

He points out that this could cause challenges for victims of domestic violence if they have a hidden phone and directs them to a video from Refuge that shows how to turn off the alert.

He ends by reminding residents that St George's Day is coming soon and asks

them to send their favourite St George's Day photos from over the years, or any photos they take as they get ready for the day, which will be included in a celebration video.



Parloes Community Hub launches with a free family fun day

Parsloes Community Hub at Kingsley Hall was launched last Thursday, 13 April with a free family fun day, making it the ninth hub to be opened in the borough.

The launch was not only an opportunity for families to have a fun-packed day of activities, but they were also able to access advice, information and guidance covering employment, finance, housing, crime reporting and much more – all of which will now be available at the Hub.

New Emergency Alerts system

The government has set up a new <u>Emergency Alerts system</u> to warn people if there's danger to life nearby, like a fire or extreme weather.

It works by sending a loud, siren-like sound and a message to people's mobile phone screens.

The new system will be tested nationally on 23 April at 3pm, with a sound and vibration that will last for about 10 seconds. People just need to tap 'OK' or swipe away the notification and they won't need to do anything else.

It is important to note that the alarm will sound even if a person's phone is on silent. Victims of domestic abuse who are worried that this could put them in danger because they have a hidden phone, should please watch this video from Refuge to find out how to turn off the alert.

Help and support available for residents through the Household Support Scheme

Residents who may be struggling with their finances or to make ends meet are being encouraged to get in touch.

Funding is available to vulnerable residents to support them with essentials over the coming months.

There are also a number of other support services including:

- Our Community Food Clubs which are free of charge and can provide £20 worth of food per week for a period of either three or six months at www.lbbd.gov.uk/community-food-clubs
- Our money and debt webpages provide an income and expenditure calculator and budgeting tools that will help people understand how much money they have coming in and how much is going out, helping them look at areas where they can make savings at www.lbbd.gov.uk/money-and-debt
- Residents who are worried about their finances and need help to tackle debt can now get advice and support from our local Barking and Dagenham Money website at: www.bdmoney.co.uk
- People struggling with increasing energy costs should contact their energy supplier about possible funds they may be entitled to, to help them through difficult periods. They can also access the Warm Homes Grant at www.gov.uk/the-warm-home-discount-scheme
- People with disabilities who aren't claiming specific disability benefits
 may be able to take advantage of a number of benefits available,
 including Personal Independence Payments, Disability Living Allowance
 (for children), and Universal Credit. For those caring for someone with
 disabilities they may be able to claim Carer's Allowance although this is
 means tested, at www.gov.uk/financial-help-disabled/disability-and-sickness-benefits
- People with a water meter who are experiencing financial difficulties may
 want to look into the Watersure scheme at
 www.ofwat.gov.uk/households/customer-assistance. Most water
 companies also have a fund to help those who are struggling, and it
 might be worth contacting their water provider.

'Our tenants deserve better' – boroughs commit to improving social housing services.

London boroughs have launched a new shared vision for delivering high-quality landlord services for council tenants.

Led by the London Housing Directors' Group with support from London Councils, Delivering for Tenants: The Foundations of an Effective Local Authority Landlord Service, sets out best practice principles on how boroughs can go beyond their statutory and regulatory responsibilities to deliver the highest possible housing standards.

Acknowledging instances of poor practice and the massive challenges facing the social housing sector, the report reiterates London boroughs' commitment to ensuring tenants are listened to and services respond efficiently and effectively to their needs.

Cllr Darren Rodwell, London Councils' Executive Member for Regeneration,

Housing and Planning, said: "Boroughs are proud social landlords. Social housing is a vital part of London's infrastructure that provides affordable homes for hundreds of thousands of Londoners.

"When it comes to deciding the future of social housing in London, national policy and investment decisions remain fundamental factors. Boroughs will continue to work with ministers on this important agenda and push for the funding required to support our shared goals."

Biodiversity and nature recovery show and tell - Thursday 20 April, 10.30am to 12noon (Online)

As councils look to tackle their net zero targets, it is important to remember that there is an ecological crisis happening as well and responses to both are intrinsically linked. A key consideration of councils is looking to the Environment Act to see what is now required of them. Local Nature Recovery Strategies, Biodiversity Net Gain, protected sites and species are just a handful of new requirements that councils now need to act on.

In this webinar, funded by Government, we will hear from a range of councils about their approaches and experiences delivering biodiversity and nature recovery activities to date. These form part of a set of case studies showcasing approaches and experience drawn from across the country which will be launched at the event by the Planning Advisory Service.

Progress on children and young people's mental health policy in England Thursday 18 May, 2pm to 3.30pm (Online)

A range of policies such as the 2017 Transforming Children and Young People's Mental Health Green Paper, the NHS Long-Term Plan, and post COVID-19 recovery, have been announced regarding children's mental health in England over the past decade. However, the scale of children's mental health needs remains of real concern to councils, schools, families and young people themselves, particularly given the impact of the pandemic, school closures and the current cost of living crisis. Children's mental health has also been highlighted in recent announcements including the Family Hubs and Best Start for Life, Schools White Paper and Special Educational Needs Green Paper. The Government is currently developing a strategy for mental health (all-age).

The Centre for Mental Health and the Children and Young People Mental Health Coalition (CYPMHC) have been commissioned by the LGA to produce a report exploring these policy approaches, announcements and steps taken to tackle the rising demand in children's mental health. It looks at the progress that has been made and what else needs to happen to ensure that central government, local government, NHS and wider partners are able to tackle children's mental health needs in England. This webinar will explore the outcomes of this report.

One to One Development Sessions

The LGA are offering councillors the opportunity to have one-to-one development conversations with one of the Leadership Academy Facilitators. This will be available to councillors in leadership positions for the next three months. These sessions are not political and will be provided by tutors from the

LGA's Leadership Academy programme who a number of councillors might have met from participation on the programmes. They will be focussed on helping councillors adapt their personal leadership style through three structured coaching calls.
