Leader's borough update

In his video this week, the Leader mentions last Friday's St George's Day celebration which saw a flag raising ceremony and bunting flying across the Town Square. He also wished Eid Mubarak to our Muslim residents who were celebrating Eid-Al-Fitr over the weekend.

He shared more good news as 95 per cent of the borough's children were offered their first preference primary school – the second-best result in London.

He ends by informing residents aged 65 years and over that they are now able

to borrow a laptop for up to six weeks for free from the Barking Learning Centre Community Hub. Free data and digital courses are also on offer as well as help with the cost of living crisis.



Council tenant kicked out of Dagenham home after attacking neighbour

A woman whose serious anti-social behaviour ended up with her being handed a jail sentence has had her home repossessed by the council.

Sonia Wells, 56, was booted out of the three-bedroom property on Comyns Road, Dagenham, after the council successfully obtained an outright possession order at a hearing at Romford County Court on Wednesday 12 April.

The move follows several attempts by the council to tackle the tenant's long-term anti-social behaviour which included harassment, intimidation, racial abuse and shouting insulting words, which included threats to burn down her neighbour's house.

After attacking a neighbour, Wells was handed a 20-week jail sentence and council enforcement officers took the opportunity to begin the process of repossessing the property.

Nine in ten children offered first preference school in B&D

Figures released on National Offer Day last week (17 April) show that 95.52% of parents in the borough (2,918 pupils) were given their first preference primary school, placing Barking and Dagenham second in London and smashing the capital's average of 88.57%.

99.08% of children received a place at one of their preferences, and 99.05% at one of their top three preferences. The demand for primary school places in the borough has been increasing and we received 3,055 applications this year, so this a great result and a credit to our School Admissions staff.

The top five boroughs for first preference offers were City of London (95.83%), Barking and Dagenham (95.52%), Hillingdon (94.93%), Newham (93.66%) and Enfield (92.47%).

Parents and carers are encouraged to accept the places they were offered by Tuesday 2 May.



Council expands popular School Streets programme

The council recently expanded its successful School Streets programme which aims to keep kids safe by reducing the amount of traffic on roads in and around schools.

A school street is a road outside a school which has a temporary traffic restriction during school pick-up and drop-off times (8am to 9.15am and 2.45pm to 4.00pm).

The scheme, which started in 2021 and now features 10 local schools, has been a hit with schools and parents alike, with many now feeling safer bringing their child to school and finding the benefits of early morning exercise.

Marsh Green Primary, Valence Primary School and Thames View Juniors have

all recently joined the programme.

Surveys of residents, schools and pupils show over 70% support the programme and many more schools want to join the scheme to improve road safety and air quality for young people.

School Streets reduce the chances of an accident taking place by drastically reducing the number of cars on roads around schools when they are at their busiest.

Currently, the programme has 10 schools taking part with 17 roads affected, with some schools closing more than one street during pick up and drop off because of multiple entrances.

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Cost of living hacks to help reduce costs


We're sharing a handful of cost of living hacks to help reduce household costs.

Boroughs commit to improving social housing services

The <u>London Housing Directors' Group</u>, with the support of London Councils, has led a new shared vision for delivering high-quality landlord services to council tenants in the capital.

Published recently, their report: <u>Delivering for Tenants: The Foundations of an Effective Local Authority Landlord Service</u>, sets out best practice principles on how boroughs can go beyond their statutory and regulatory responsibilities to deliver the highest possible housing standards.

London Councils' Executive Member for Regeneration, Housing & Planning, Cllr Darren Rodwell, said: "Boroughs are proud social landlords. Social housing is a vital part of London's infrastructure that provides affordable homes for hundreds of thousands of Londoners. "However, the social housing sector is under massive pressure. Too often we have seen examples of tenants living in poor quality housing and receiving a substandard service. Our tenants deserve better. Everyone should have a home that they can be proud of. This report will help us make that ambition a reality and I am grateful to everyone – especially tenants who contributed to putting it together.

"When it comes to deciding the future of social housing in London, national policy and investment decisions remain fundamental factors. Boroughs will continue to work with ministers on this important agenda and push for the funding required to support our shared goals."

Primary Schools admission figures

98 per cent of children due to start primary school in London this September have been offered a place at one of their preferred schools, figures published by the Pan London Admissions Board revealed last week.

The Pan London Admissions Board has overall responsibility for the school application co-ordination scheme in the capital. Membership includes representatives of the Association of London Directors of Children's Services, the London Inter Authority Admissions Group and the London Grid for Learning.

London primary schools received 87,277 applications in total this year, a 2.67 per cent decrease compared to last year.

London Councils Executive Member for Children and Young People, Cllr Ian Edwards, said: "It is positive that once again the overwhelming majority of children have an offer from one of their preferred schools. Boroughs have worked diligently with schools to ensure there are the places needed to meet demand across the capital.

"London boroughs are continuing to work with schools experiencing decreasing demand for school places to achieve good outcomes for young Londoners. London still has the best performing schools in the country, and it is essential we protect them in this difficult climate.

"We remain keen to work with government to respond to pressures surrounding primary school places and to support the growing demand for development of specialist SEND provision at a local level, ensuring that all London pupils have the best start in life."

The LGA are offering the following sessions:

Progress on children and young people's mental health policy in England - Thursday 18 May, 2pm to 3.30pm (Online)

A range of policies such as the 2017 Transforming Children and Young People's Mental Health Green Paper, the NHS Long-Term Plan, and post COVID-19 recovery, have been announced regarding children's mental health in England over the past decade. However, the scale of children's mental health needs remains of real concern to councils, schools, families and young people themselves, particularly given the impact of the pandemic, school closures and the current cost of living crisis. Children's mental health has also been highlighted in recent announcements including the Family Hubs and Best Start for Life, Schools White Paper and Special Educational Needs Green Paper. The Government is currently developing a strategy for mental health (all-age).

The Centre for Mental Health and the Children and Young People Mental Health Coalition (CYPMHC) have been commissioned by the LGA to produce a report exploring these policy approaches, announcements and steps taken to tackle the rising demand in children's mental health. It looks at the progress that has been made and what else needs to happen to ensure that central government, local government, NHS and wider partners are able to tackle children's mental health needs in England. This webinar will explore the outcomes of this report.

One to One Development Sessions

This will be available to councillors in leadership positions for the next three months.
