Leader's borough update

In his video this week, the Leader reports from Barking Abbey at the unveiling of the model of the Abbey and its history and invites residents to pop down and visit this historical site.



Barking Abbey Model unveiled

Last week saw the unveiling of the model of Barking Abbey as well as improvement works including a new public space at the entrance of the Curfew Tower.

The Curfew Tower (formerly the Fire Bell Gate) is the only remaining gateway of Barking's Saxon Abbey. It is a Grade II listed building which was originally built in 1370. The bell rang to remind people to put out fires and lights before the nightly curfew – a practice which didn't cease until 1900. There is a chapel built into the tower – which holds a stone relic called the Holy Rood which was visited by pilgrims in medieval times and has also survived the demolition of the Abbey.

Rich in history, the 'Abbey Gate' - as it was also known - is the only gateway to Barking Abbey still standing, following the abbey's closure and demolition

during Henry VIII's reign. The abbey ruins are listed as a Scheduled Monument by Historic England and are at the heart of the heritage Conservation Area in Barking town centre.

As part of the Barking Abbey and Town Centre Heritage Project delivered by Be First and funded by The National Lottery Heritage Fund, landscaping works were carried out for the public realm in front of the tower. The improvements create an attractive and useful open space for the local community.

The York stone has been re-set with a cobbled border to represent the ancient Church Path and draw people towards the medieval gateway, St Margaret's Church, and Abbey ruins.

The works promote Barking's heritage too. A bronze model of Barking Abbey, and heritage mosaics celebrating Abbey Green and the protest heritage of the 'Three Lamps' have recently been installed. Pupils from St Joseph's and St Margaret's Primary Schools buried a time capsule of writings and illustrations about Barking's past, present and future.

Residents invited to have their say on air quality in the borough

Moving from Tax Credit to Universal Credit

Residents who receive either Working Tax and/or Child Tax Credits, and no other benefits, are being reminded that they will soon be invited to claim Universal Credit by the Department of Work and Pensions (DWP).

DWP will be writing to residents who claim Tax Credits only and inviting them to claim Universal Credit within three months. This does not apply to anyone who receives legacy benefits such as Employment and Support Allowance, Jobseekers Allowance, Income Support or Housing Benefit with tax credits.

Residents are reminded to wait until they are invited before making a claim. This is because if the amount they receive in Universal Credit is lower than their current tax credit, protection will be applied so they don't lose any money.

Information on how to apply for Universal Credit will be included in the letter from DWP.

Residents who need additional support to complete their application, can get help through <u>Citizens Advice</u>.

Help and support available for residents through the Household Support Scheme

Residents who may be struggling with their finances or to make ends meet are being encouraged to get in touch.

Funding is available to vulnerable residents to support them with essentials over the coming months.

- Our money and debt webpages provide an income and expenditure calculator and budgeting tools that will help people understand how much money they have coming in and how much is going out, helping them look at areas where they can make savings at www.lbbd.gov.uk/money-and-debt

- People struggling with increasing energy costs should contact their energy supplier about possible funds they may be entitled to, to help them through difficult periods. They can also access the Warm Homes Grant at www.gov.uk/the-warm-home-discount-scheme
- People with disabilities who aren't claiming specific disability benefits
 may be able to take advantage of a number of benefits available,
 including Personal Independence Payments, Disability Living Allowance
 (for children), and Universal Credit. For those caring for someone with
 disabilities they may be able to claim Carer's Allowance although this is
 means tested, at www.gov.uk/financial-help-disabled/disability-and-sickness-benefits
- People with a water meter who are experiencing financial difficulties may
 want to look into the Watersure scheme at
 www.ofwat.gov.uk/households/customer-assistance. Most water
 companies also have a fund to help those who are struggling, and it
 might be worth contacting their water provider.
- People who are out of work and looking to get into employment can get help and support from our Job Shops at www.lbbd.gov.uk/help-finding-work

Building London's sustainable and inclusive future

Funding for support services for victims and survivors of VAWG

Funding for Violence Against Women and Girls (VAWG) support services is fragmented, complex and difficult to understand, leading to some victims and survivors falling through the gaps, a new report commissioned by London Councils reveals.

The report by AVA (Action Against Violence and Abuse), launched at a parliamentary event last Wednesday, 24 May shines a light on the funding landscape of support services for victims and survivors of VAWG by mapping current available funding and its impact on people's lives.

It reveals a number of significant challenges support services are facing in accessing funding which undermine their ability to provide a sustainable high-quality service. These include the fact that the majority of funding available for VAWG support services is short term, which can mean that key staff are often on notice to be made redundant as the next tranche of funding is sought.

London Councils Executive Member for Community Safety and Violence Against Women and Girls, Cllr Jas Athwal, said: "This short-term nature of funding to provide support services means vulnerable Londoners are being exposed to unnecessary risk whilst facing barriers in accessing the vital support they need. We need long term and sustainable funding to ensure that Londoners can access the right support for them and at the right time.

"VAWG is endemic in our society, and it has to stop. London boroughs are working together to highlight it and to do everything we can to tackle it in all its forms, working in conjunction with our partners. London Councils' report sets out just how vital support services for survivors of VAWG are, and why it's so important that we secure long-term funding guarantees to be able to deliver it."

Renters' (Reform) Bill

The government has published its long-anticipated Renters' (Reform) Bill, setting out the government's proposed changes to the law in relation to rented homes, including provision abolishing fixed term assured tenancies and assured shorthold tenancies; imposing obligations on landlords and others in relation to rented homes and temporary and supported accommodation.

Responding to the Bill's publication, <u>London Councils' Executive Member for Regeneration</u>, <u>Housing & Planning</u>, <u>Cllr Darren Rodwell</u>, said: "Two million Londoners live in private rented sector homes, and they all deserve stronger protection.

"Banning no-fault evictions is an essential step forward. Too often we've seen Londoners turfed out of their homes for no good reason and made homeless, turning their lives upside down. With London's homelessness pressures at near-record levels, we cannot afford for things to continue as they are.

"Boroughs want to work with the government to make a success of these reforms, but it is vital that councils are provided with the powers and resources we need to enforce the new rules. We will also continue to push for more action on the other issues driving London's housing shortage. This includes addressing the chronic shortage of affordable housing in the capital and using the benefits system to provide more support for renters struggling to pay their rent."

London Infrastructure Framework

The London Infrastructure Framework, launched by London Councils at UKREiff in Leeds, brings together a pipeline of strategic infrastructure projects for London with pan-London cross-party support in one place.

The Framework sets out the role of infrastructure in building a more inclusive, sustainable and prosperous London. It highlights the need for new partnership and financing models for our infrastructure and regeneration projects, underpinning our desire for an ambitious new growth deal for London that allows the city to keep more of the proceeds of local growth so that the capital can fully contribute to the drive for national growth.

Adult social care assurance: the return of regulation and the role of elected members: Tuesday 6 June, 1.30pm to 3pm (Online)

On 1 April 2023, a new system of adult social care assurance went live. Under the Health and Care Act 2022, the Care Quality Commission (CQC) has a new duty to independently review and assess councils' delivery of their adult social care duties under the Care Act, and the Secretary of State for Health and Social Care has new legal powers for statutory intervention in cases where a council is judged to be failing, or has failed, to discharge its duties. A programme of improvement and support will also be part of the assurance process.

The role of elected Members in assurance is important, as is the role of democratic leadership in maximising the opportunities of assurance and mitigating its risks. This webinar – specifically aimed at elected Members – will bring together senior colleagues from the Department of Health and Social Care, the regulator and local government. Delegates will hear updates on all

recent developments and have plenty of opportunity to raise questions and comments with all speakers.

One to One Development Sessions

The LGA are offering councillors the opportunity to have one-to-one development conversations with one of the Leadership Academy Facilitators. This will be available to councillors in leadership positions for the next three months. These sessions are not political and will be provided by tutors from the LGA's Leadership Academy programme who a number of councillors might have met from participation on the programmes. They will be focussed on helping councillors adapt their personal leadership style through three structured coaching calls.
