As part of our efforts to support residents through the cost of living crisis, Cllr Jane Jones, Cabinet Member for Children's Social Care & Disabilities, and Cllr Elizabeth Kangethe, Cabinet Member for Educational Attainment & School Improvement, visited Future Youth Zone to see the work they do and to hear about the help and support the council and its partners are providing to local people to help them through the crisis.

At Future Youth Zone, a purpose-built facility for young people aged 9 to 19 and up to 25 for those with a disability can pay a £5 annual membership fee and 50p per visit as well as get access to a meal for £1.

Residents invited to open a savings account today through Barking and Dagenham Money

Over £100,000 in affordable loans have so far been handed out to borough residents through our partnership with Leeds Credit Union.

The partnership aims to bring more affordable loans options and saving accounts to residents through Barking and Dagenham Money (BD Money).

The aim is to help local people become more financially resilient, keep more money in their pockets and access appropriate services to meet their financial needs and ambitions. This is not-for-profit, with all benefits staying in the community.

Help and support available for residents through the Household Support Scheme

Residents who may be struggling with their finances or to make ends meet are being encouraged to get in touch.

Funding is available to vulnerable residents to support them with essentials over the coming months.

There are also <u>a number of other support services</u> including:

- Our Community Food Clubs which are free of charge and can provide £20 worth of food per week for a period of either three or six months at www.lbbd.gov.uk/community-food-clubs
- Our money and debt webpages provide an income and expenditure calculator and budgeting tools that will help people understand how much money they have coming in and how much is going out, helping

them look at areas where they can make savings at www.lbbd.gov.uk/money-and-debt

- Residents who are worried about their finances and need help to tackle debt can now get advice and support from our local Barking and Dagenham Money website at: <u>www.bdmoney.co.uk</u>
- People struggling with increasing energy costs should contact their energy supplier about possible funds they may be entitled to, to help them through difficult periods. They can also access the Warm Homes Grant at www.gov.uk/the-warm-home-discount-scheme
- People with disabilities who aren't claiming specific disability benefits may be able to take advantage of a number of benefits available, including Personal Independence Payments, Disability Living Allowance (for children), and Universal Credit. For those caring for someone with disabilities they may be able to claim Carer's Allowance although this is means tested, at <u>www.gov.uk/financial-help-disabled/disability-andsickness-benefits</u>
- People with a water meter who are experiencing financial difficulties may want to look into the Watersure scheme at <u>www.ofwat.gov.uk/households/customer-assistance</u>. Most water companies also have a fund to help those who are struggling, and it might be worth contacting their water provider.
- People who are out of work and looking to get into employment can get help and support from our Job Shops at <u>www.lbbd.gov.uk/help-finding-</u> work
- Anyone worried about a lack of skills can find courses and support on the Adult College website at <u>https://adultcollege.lbbd.gov.uk/</u>
- Residents who need help with emergency living expenses for food, fuel (gas and electric for customers who pay via a key meter), travel expenses and household appliances and/or clothing in exceptional circumstances can apply for help from our Hardship Fund (Individual Assistance Payment) at <u>https://www.lbbd.gov.uk/benefits-and-</u> <u>support/discretionary-hardship-support/discretionary-financial-support-</u> <u>schemes</u>.

Local Government News

A week in parliament

London Councils sent briefings to London MPs ahead of three debates in the House of Commons last week on matters affecting London local government.

Last Monday, MPs debated <u>the role local government has to play in achieving</u> <u>'net zero'</u>. Ahead of the debate, London Councils briefed London MPs on London boroughs' Climate Action Plans, the range of <u>cross-borough</u> <u>collaborative programmes</u> to reduce carbon-based emissions and improve the capital's resilience to severe weather, and the innovative <u>3Ci partnership</u> founded by London Councils, Connected Places Catapult and Core Cities UK to securing private investment into price-based net zero delivery. <u>You can read</u> <u>the briefing here</u>.

On the same day, <u>MPs debated delivering new housing supply</u> and London Councils briefed MPs on the challenges of addressing the capital's acute housing shortage. While London Councils welcomes the government's recent changes to Public Works Loan Board borrowing rates and rules around the use of Right to Buy receipts, we believe further intervention is needed if affordable housebuilding is to continue. <u>You can read the briefing here</u>.

Last Wednesday, the <u>Westminster Hall debate</u> explored the issues and implications around pupil role numbers and school closures in London. <u>Following London Councils' report earlier this year on school places in London</u>, which found that London local authorities and schools are currently dealing with a significant and sustained period of reduction in demand for reception and Year 7 places, London Councils briefed London MPs on the report's main findings and policy implications. <u>You can read the briefing here</u>.

Get Online London, which provides refurbished digital equipment and skills training to digitally excluded Londoners has been shortlisted for the Digital Public Service Innovation of the Year Award.

Get Online London is London's first digital inclusion service. It is delivered by the London Office of Innovation and Technology (LOTI) and Good Things Foundation and supported by the Mayor of London.

This session will provide:

- An explanation of the purpose and background of the Board's groundbreaking Code of Transparency.

- A facilitated discussion on the information that fund officers should be receiving and how this information should be reported to pension boards and committees.

This will be available to councillors in leadership positions for the next three months.
