

Local residents are being offered the chance to train and get industry accredited qualifications in the construction industry.

The Barking Riverside Innovation in Construction Centre is offering residents the opportunity to train for CSCS courses. On completion, participants will be able to safely work in the construction industry.

Courses include a three-day Level 1 in Health and Safety in a Construction Environment; CSCS test and preparation ultimately leading to the award of a CSCS card. In addition, the service can also assist participants to acquire other construction industry related cards.

Residents invited to open a savings account today through Barking and Dagenham Money

Over £100,000 in affordable loans have so far been handed out to borough residents through our partnership with Leeds Credit Union.

Help and support available for residents through the Household Support Scheme

Residents who may be struggling with their finances or to make ends meet are being encouraged to get in touch.

Funding is available to vulnerable residents to support them with essentials over the coming months.

- Our money and debt webpages provide an income and expenditure calculator and budgeting tools that will help people understand how much money they have coming in and how much is going out, helping

them look at areas where they can make savings at <u>www.lbbd.gov.uk/money-and-debt</u>

- Residents who are worried about their finances and need help to tackle debt can now get advice and support from our local Barking and Dagenham Money website at: <u>www.bdmoney.co.uk</u>
- People struggling with increasing energy costs should contact their energy supplier about possible funds they may be entitled to, to help them through difficult periods. They can also access the Warm Homes Grant at <u>www.gov.uk/the-warm-home-discount-scheme</u>
- People with disabilities who aren't claiming specific disability benefits may be able to take advantage of a number of benefits available, including Personal Independence Payments, Disability Living Allowance (for children), and Universal Credit. For those caring for someone with disabilities they may be able to claim Carer's Allowance although this is means tested, at <u>www.gov.uk/financial-help-disabled/disability-andsickness-benefits</u>
- People with a water meter who are experiencing financial difficulties may want to look into the Watersure scheme at <u>www.ofwat.gov.uk/households/customer-assistance</u>. Most water companies also have a fund to help those who are struggling, and it might be worth contacting their water provider.
- People who are out of work and looking to get into employment can get help and support from our Job Shops at <u>www.lbbd.gov.uk/help-finding-</u> work
- Anyone worried about a lack of skills can find courses and support on the Adult College website at <u>https://adultcollege.lbbd.gov.uk/</u>
- Residents who need help with emergency living expenses for food, fuel (gas and electric for customers who pay via a key meter), travel expenses and household appliances and/or clothing in exceptional circumstances can apply for help from our Hardship Fund (Individual Assistance Payment) at <u>https://www.lbbd.gov.uk/benefits-and-</u> <u>support/discretionary-hardship-support/discretionary-financial-support-</u> <u>schemes</u>.

Devolution is key to addressing challenges UK cities are facing

London Councils has welcomed a major new report from the <u>UK Urban Futures</u> <u>Commission</u> which has called for the government 'to release the handbrake' on investment to unleash the potential of UK cities.

The report, produced in partnership between the Royal Society for Arts, Manufacturers and Commerce (RSA) and Core Cities UK, hopes a new suite of local powers can help boost growth, repair the social fabric and meet net zero targets.

Responding to the report, <u>London Councils' Acting Chair Cllr Claire Holland</u>, said:

"Devolving more power and resources to the local level is key to addressing so many of the challenges communities face across the country – and this applies to London too.

"Compared to other countries around the world, the UK still operates within a highly centralised national structure that too often undermines local leaders' ability to get the best possible results for residents.

"Boroughs in the capital are as determined as ever that London's devolution journey is not yet over. With more financial levers at our disposal, we would be in a much stronger position to boost growth and invest in the long-term future of Londoners' local services. We will continue to work alongside cities from across the UK in pushing forward this vital agenda."

Members' Training

Training from the Local Government Information Unit (LGiU)

The LGiU are offering the following sessions: <u>Community Engagement:</u> Tuesday 17 October, 9.30am to 12.30pm (Online) So, you have some of the basics of being a councillor under your belt. You know how to resolve a piece of casework and you understand your council's decision-making processes. What now? How do you start to tackle some of the big issues that you got elected to fix?

Councillors are unique in having the democratic mandate for 'leadership of place'. You can use your powers of collaboration and convening to help your communities to thrive. You can hear the silent majority and influence behavioural change. You can bring their big issues to the council as well as get their backing for your big plans for the area.

<u>Managing Casework:</u> Tuesday 28 November, 9.30am to 12.30pm (Online) Sustainably carrying out multiple roles and working with a variety of people requires resilience and a healthy work-life balance.

Personal resilience is about maintaining a sense of well-being, being mentally strong, effectively meeting different demands and performing at one's best on behalf of individuals, and communities as well as being an effective leader. This is a very practical seminar that will provide each participant with methods and helpful ideas to manage the pressures they face and enable them to be able to maximise the positive aspects of being an elected member.

Training from the Local Government Association (LGA)

The LGA are offering the following sessions:

Election matters: Introducing the new digital campaigning imprints regime: Tuesday 17 October, 2.00pm to 3.30pm

Transparency of campaigning materials is vital to transparency and fairness at local and national electoral events. Digital imprints will help to ensure that digital campaigning is brought into the same regulatory space as print materials and increase the transparency of digital campaigning.

This session, primarily aimed at councillors but will be of interest to those working in electoral services, will briefly explore the reasons for the introduction

of digital imprints and how the new regime will work in practice.

Adult social care assurance: learning from the CQC pilots and the elected member perspective: Tuesday 17 October, 10.30am to 12.45pm

The Health and Care Act 2022 puts Care Quality Commission (CQC) assurance of local authorities on a statutory footing. The new duty on the CQC to assess local authorities' delivery of their adult social care (ASC) duties under Part 1 of the Care Act 2014 came into effect on 1 April 2023. Five end-to-end pilots of the assessment process are taking place between July and early September 2023 in Lincolnshire, Nottingham City, Birmingham, North Lincolnshire and Suffolk councils. We are reviewing this learning and preparing for the first tranche of 20 council assessments.

Finance without numbers – An introduction to local government finance:

Thursday 2 November, 6.00pm to 7.30pm

This virtual event is for newly elected members or those just looking for a refresh. The event will provide an overview of local government finance without any numbers - focusing instead on roles and responsibilities, key terminology and processes. It will give you an understanding of both what you need to be aware of in your role and what you need to understand about your authority's role. The session will cover:

- Members' role in finance
- How finance decisions are made
- Some key financial issues and terminology

One to One Development Sessions

The LGA are offering councillors the opportunity to have one-to-one development conversations with one of the Leadership Academy Facilitators. This will be available to councillors in leadership positions for the next three months. These sessions are not political and will be provided by tutors from the LGA's Leadership Academy programme who a number of councillors might have met from participation on the programmes. They will be focussed on

helping councillors adapt their personal leadership style through three structured coaching calls.
