Local group launches Poppy Appeal campaign

Volunteers from the Ahmadiyya Muslim Elders Association in Barking have launched this year's Poppy Appeal campaign at Barking Town Hall.

The partnership with the Royal British Legion saw the group raise over £900,000 last year at Westminster and Liverpool Street stations and are aiming for a target of £1m this year.

The launch event was attended by Cllr Dominic Twomey, Deputy Leader and Cabinet Member for Finance, Growth & Core Services, who was joined by former Mayor Peter Chand.



Residents invited to have their say on changes to the Council Tax Support Scheme

Residents are being invited to have their say on proposed changes to our working age Council Tax Support Scheme. The proposed changes include the

introduction of income bands, making it easier for residents to identify the discounts they are eligible for.

The proposals may result in changes to some of the amounts people receive. Any potential changes would take effect from 1 April 2024.


Equalities and Diversity Fund is back

The BRIC training centre in Barking Riverside is offering construction training and qualifications plus brand-new test centre facilities where interested residents can book for their CITB Health, Safety and Environment tests. They will also be able to gain a Level 1 Health and Safety in Construction qualification.

On successful completion of the course, participants will gain the green CSCS labourer card which will allow them to work safely in the construction industry. Staff at the BRIC will also assist participants in gaining other industry related construction cards.

Residents who may be struggling with their finances or to make ends meet are being encouraged to get in touch.

Funding is available to vulnerable residents to support them with essentials over the coming months.

- Our money and debt webpages provide an income and expenditure calculator and budgeting tools that will help people understand how much money they have coming in and how much is going out, helping them look at areas where they can make savings at www.lbbd.gov.uk/money-and-debt
- Residents who are worried about their finances and need help to tackle debt can now get advice and support from our local Barking and Dagenham Money website at: www.bdmoney.co.uk
- People struggling with increasing energy costs should contact their energy supplier about possible funds they may be entitled to, to help them through difficult periods. They can also access the Warm Homes Grant at www.gov.uk/the-warm-home-discount-scheme
- People with disabilities who aren't claiming specific disability benefits
 may be able to take advantage of a number of benefits available,
 including Personal Independence Payments, Disability Living Allowance
 (for children), and Universal Credit. For those caring for someone with
 disabilities they may be able to claim Carer's Allowance although this is
 means tested, at www.gov.uk/financial-help-disabled/disability-and-sickness-benefits
- People with a water meter who are experiencing financial difficulties may
 want to look into the Watersure scheme at
 www.ofwat.gov.uk/households/customer-assistance. Most water
 companies also have a fund to help those who are struggling, and it
 might be worth contacting their water provider.
- People who are out of work and looking to get into employment can get help and support from our Job Shops at www.lbbd.gov.uk/help-finding-work
- Anyone worried about a lack of skills can find courses and support on the Adult College website at https://adultcollege.lbbd.gov.uk/
- Residents who need help with emergency living expenses for food, fuel (gas and electric for customers who pay via a key meter), travel expenses and household appliances and/or clothing in exceptional

Transformative local climate action projects showcased in Parliament

Climate change remains one of the biggest threats facing our communities and councils recognise the urgency and scale of the challenge, with over 300 declaring climate emergencies.

Last Tuesday, 24 October, London Councils, (represented by Cllr Kieron Williams, Chair of London Councils Transport and Environment Committee and Cllr Clem Kemhali, Vice Chair of the Transport and Environment Committee) attended a Back Local Climate Action drop-in session in Parliament alongside the Local Government Association, County Councils Network and District Councils Network.

Together they showcased some of the transformative local climate action projects that councils are leading and spoke to MPs and Members of the House of Lords about what local government needs from government to achieve net zero faster and more efficiently, in a way that delivers the greatest benefit to our communities.
