We'll continue to ensure our residents benefit from all the opportunities the film industry brings, as we continue to shift the film production dial towards east London.



Council Leader first to sign the rough sleeping Charter

Amid worsening homelessness pressures in London, Cllr Darren Rodwell was joined by Parm Orchard, CEO of <u>Connections</u> and London Councils' colleagues as the first council leader to sign the London Charter to end rough sleeping.

The <u>Charter</u> was created by a pan-London coalition working to end rough sleeping, and enshrines principles and actions needed to tackle the issue. London Councils has been a key partner, driving the project forward alongside homelessness charities, the GLA and Bloomberg Associates.

More than 10,000 people were seen rough sleeping by outreach teams in London in 2022/23. Boroughs provide crucial frontline support to those sleeping rough and help getting them off the streets.

More than 330 homes go up at one of London's largest regeneration schemes

The council and Be First recently celebrated the start of construction on the third phase of Gascoigne East with a groundbreaking ceremony held with contractor Wates Group.

The latest phase at Gascoigne Neighbourhood – one of London's largest regeneration projects will deliver 334 high-quality new homes with half at discount market rent and half at affordable rent.

This £148m phase will see the building of children's play area, a small park and fantastic public realm improvements.



Free parking extended to an hour for borough residents

Earlier this year we announced the extension of free parking at on street locations and some council-owned car parks.

From Thursday 14 December, residents will now be able to park at small shopping parades (on street) and at existing and future Pay-by-Phone locations for free for one hour – an increase from the previous 30-minute offer.





The BRIC training centre in Barking Riverside is offering construction training and qualifications plus brand-new test centre facilities where interested residents can book for their CITB Health, Safety and Environment tests. They will also be able to gain a Level 1 Health and Safety in Construction qualification.

On successful completion of the course, participants will gain the green CSCS labourer card which will allow them to work safely in the construction industry. Staff at the BRIC will also assist participants in gaining other industry related construction cards.

Help and support available for residents through the Household Support Scheme

Funding is available to vulnerable residents to support them with essentials over the coming months.

- much money they have coming in and how much is going out, helping them look at areas where they can make savings at www.lbbd.gov.uk/money-and-debt
- Residents who are worried about their finances and need help to tackle debt can now get advice and support from our local Barking and Dagenham Money website at: www.bdmoney.co.uk
- People struggling with increasing energy costs should contact their energy supplier about possible funds they may be entitled to, to help them through difficult periods. They can also access the Warm Homes Grant at www.gov.uk/the-warm-home-discount-scheme
- People with disabilities who aren't claiming specific disability benefits
 may be able to take advantage of a number of benefits available,
 including Personal Independence Payments, Disability Living Allowance
 (for children), and Universal Credit. For those caring for someone with
 disabilities they may be able to claim Carer's Allowance although this is
 means tested, at www.gov.uk/financial-help-disabled/disability-and-sickness-benefits
- People with a water meter who are experiencing financial difficulties may
 want to look into the Watersure scheme at
 www.ofwat.gov.uk/households/customer-assistance. Most water
 companies also have a fund to help those who are struggling, and it
 might be worth contacting their water provider.
- People who are out of work and looking to get into employment can get help and support from our Job Shops at www.lbbd.gov.uk/help-finding-work

Cost-of-living preventing Londoners from reducing carbon emissions by saving energy

Almost three-quarters of Londoners (73%) say the cost-of-living crisis has made it more difficult for them to take action to help prevent climate change, new polling commissioned by London Councils reveals.

In the fourth year of research polling by London Councils to gauge Londoners' understanding of climate change, respondents also said that cost is a barrier which limits Londoners from choosing greener heating or energy options, despite the fact that actions such as insulating their home could save them money in the long term.

London boroughs are responding to this challenge by improving the social housing they own to make it more energy efficient – for example by installing new wall insulation. Boroughs are also shifting how they use their planning powers so they incentivise developers to make newly-built homes and buildings energy efficient by design.

<u>Cllr Kieron Williams, London Councils' Executive Member for Climate Change, Transport and Environment,</u> said: "It is sobering to see that the cost-of-living crisis prevents Londoners from taking action on issues that are important to them, such as investing in climate action.

"68% of Londoners have grown more concerned about climate change over the past 12 months. It is inspiring to see that their motivation to take action to address climate change is consistently high year on year. Many are already making sustainable choices, such as recycling old clothes and electronics.

"Decision makers in London boroughs, national government and businesses must harness this motivation to bring in a new sustainable way of living that drives the green economy. That way, we can truly address the climate emergency, bring down people's bills and bring in a greener, cleaner and healthier London from the ground up."
