

Leader's borough update

Free parking extended to an hour for borough residents

Earlier this year we announced the extension of free parking at on street locations and some council-owned car parks.

Since last Thursday, 14 December, residents can now park at small shopping parades (on street) and at existing and future Pay-by-Phone locations for free for one hour – an increase from the previous 30-minute offer.

For residents to benefit from the free parking sessions, drivers must be registered via the PayByPhone App or by calling 020 7005 0055.

Council launches partnership to support local business

The Amplify programme is a brand-new business support initiative funded through the UK Shared Prosperity Fund. The 18-month programme offers a tailored package of support to build the capacity of key local supply chains in growth sectors particularly film, care and food.

The programme will help create, safeguard and improve local jobs by supporting local business growth, create awareness and help them take advantage of new local support chain, commercial space and market opportunities in both the public and private sectors.

It will also help to increase the number of local businesses that are able to bid for and win contracts with the council and other local partner organisations.


Six residents awarded the Leader's Recognition Award for help with last summer's fire

Residents interested in a career in the construction industry are being invited to get in touch with the Barking Riverside Innovation in Construction Centre (BRIC).

The BRIC training centre in Barking Riverside is offering construction training and qualifications plus brand-new test centre facilities where interested residents can book for their CITB Health, Safety and Environment tests. They will also be able to gain a Level 1 Health and Safety in Construction qualification.

On successful completion of the course, participants will gain the green CSCS labourer card which will allow them to work safely in the construction industry. Staff at the BRIC will also assist participants in gaining other industry related construction cards.

Help and support available for residents through the Household Support Scheme

Residents who may be struggling with their finances or to make ends meet are being encouraged to get in touch.

Funding is available to vulnerable residents to support them with essentials over the coming months.

There are also <u>a number of other support services</u> including:

- Our Community Food Clubs which are free of charge and can provide £20 worth of food per week for a period of either three or six months at <u>www.lbbd.gov.uk/community-food-clubs</u>
- Our money and debt webpages provide an income and expenditure calculator and budgeting tools that will help people understand how much money they have coming in and how much is going out, helping them look at areas where they can make savings at www.lbbd.gov.uk/money-and-debt
- Residents who are worried about their finances and need help to tackle debt can now get advice and support from our local Barking and Dagenham Money website at: <u>www.bdmoney.co.uk</u>
- People struggling with increasing energy costs should contact their energy supplier about possible funds they may be entitled to, to help them through difficult periods. They can also access the Warm Homes Grant at <u>www.gov.uk/the-warm-home-discount-scheme</u>
- People with disabilities who aren't claiming specific disability benefits may be able to take advantage of a number of benefits available, including Personal Independence Payments, Disability Living Allowance (for children), and Universal Credit. For those caring for someone with disabilities they may be able to claim Carer's Allowance although this is means tested, at <u>www.gov.uk/financial-help-disabled/disability-andsickness-benefits</u>
- People with a water meter who are experiencing financial difficulties may want to look into the Watersure scheme at <u>www.ofwat.gov.uk/households/customer-assistance</u>. Most water companies also have a fund to help those who are struggling, and it might be worth contacting their water provider.

- People who are out of work and looking to get into employment can get help and support from our Job Shops at <u>www.lbbd.gov.uk/help-finding-</u> work
- Anyone worried about a lack of skills can find courses and support on the Adult College website at <u>https://adultcollege.lbbd.gov.uk/</u>
- Residents who need help with emergency living expenses for food, fuel (gas and electric for customers who pay via a key meter), travel expenses and household appliances and/or clothing in exceptional circumstances can apply for help from our Hardship Fund (Individual Assistance Payment) at <u>https://www.lbbd.gov.uk/benefits-and-</u> <u>support/discretionary-hardship-support/discretionary-financial-support-</u> <u>schemes</u>.

Local Government News

Rising numbers of homeless refugees in London

London Councils has released new research revealing the growing number of refugees and asylum seekers becoming homeless after leaving Home Office accommodation in London.

Between September and October this year, there was a 39 per cent increase in refugees and asylum seekers making homeless presentations.

<u>Cllr Grace Williams, London Councils' Executive Member for Communities,</u> <u>said</u>: "Boroughs are deeply concerned by the situation, which will only get more dangerous as winter sets in. Those granted asylum need adequate support for settling in the UK, yet too often are forced into sleeping rough on the streets.

"At a time when London already faces enormous and unsustainable homelessness, pressures, the government urgently needs to prevent this happening. A longer move-on period for those leaving Home Office accommodation is crucial, as well as funding for the councils whose local services provide vital support and sanctuary for those in need."

This coincided with London Councils hailing <u>the launch of a London Charter to</u> <u>End Rough Sleeping</u>. The Charter was created by a pan-London coalition working to end rough sleeping, and enshrines principles and actions needed to tackle the issue. <u>London Councils has been a key partner</u> from the start, driving the project forward alongside homelessness charities, the GLA and Bloomberg Associates.

London businesses urge government action on climate change and affordable housing

The results of the seventh annual London Councils and London Chamber of Commerce and Industry (LCCI) Business 1000 survey have been released.

Surveying more than 1,200 London businesses, the findings show that businesses think the next UK government should prioritise tackling climate change and increasing affordable housing (joint at 29%), followed by improving public transport (27%) and easing international trade restrictions (26%). The survey also found out that businesses strongly support greater devolution of powers to local councils, including more control over skills, housing and infrastructure investment.

Mayor Jason Perry, London Councils' Executive Member for London's Future, said: "Businesses have faced unprecedented challenges in recent years and now the increasing cost of doing business, driven by high housing costs and inflation, is putting them under further strain.

"There is a clear need for further devolution to strengthen business across the capital, London government currently controls around 7% of the tax raised locally, compared to New York's 50%.

Green Skills for transition to Net Zero

London Councils has highlighted that skills shortages are preventing the green economy from achieving climate goals.

The Green Skills report released last week mapped London government skills activity to help cut carbon emissions and achieve net zero. It sought to identify gaps, duplication and areas that need better co-ordination, as well as setting out some of the main skills, challenges and opportunities in the green economy.

<u>Mayor Rokhsana Fiaz, London Councils' Executive Member for Skills and</u> <u>Employment, said</u>: "London boroughs are committed to achieving net zero and doubling the size of the green economy by 2030.

"The Green Skills report shows why we need a real focus and long-term funding for green skills. We also need clear strategic direction from national government so the whole country is pulling together on developing the green economy, as well as greater devolution to councils so we can have the powers and autonomy to get things done."

Transformation in Barnet

Last week marked the <u>opening of Brent Cross West</u>, the first major new mainline station in London in over a decade.

The Thameslink station will serve the new £8 billion Brent Cross Town development, which includes 6,500 new homes and a new university campus for Sheffield Hallam University. It also has one of the largest air source heat pump installations in Europe and will be net zero by 2030.

Mayor Sadiq Khan joined Barnet residents and rail enthusiasts for the opening early last week.
