Residents urged to give their views on our 2024/25 budget proposals

We're asking residents to have their say on our 2024/25 budget proposals.

Councils are facing severe financial pressures up and down the country. In Barking and Dagenham, our government funding has fallen by 40% since 2010. We now face rising inflation, with increased demand for services and increased costs, especially in children's and adult services, and for energy and utilities.

To balance our budget, we are reviewing all our services and making sure we are getting value for money from every pound we spend. This includes taking a

number of measures to immediately reduce our spending, such as a pause on recruitment, making staff savings and stopping all non-essential spending.

To continue to provide key services for the most vulnerable in our community, the council is proposing a 5% increase in Council Tax, including 2% ringfenced for social care, which will add around £1.40 per week onto the average band D property (excluding the GLA element) from April.


- Dagenham Library Community Hub, every Monday, 3pm to 7pm and every Thursday 10am to 2pm

Residents interested in a career in the construction industry are being invited to get in touch with the Barking Riverside Innovation in Construction Centre (BRIC).

The BRIC training centre in Barking Riverside is offering construction training and qualifications plus brand-new test centre facilities where interested residents can book for their CITB Health, Safety and Environment tests. They will also be able to gain a Level 1 Health and Safety in Construction qualification.

On successful completion of the course, participants will gain the green CSCS labourer card which will allow them to work safely in the construction industry. Staff at the BRIC will also assist participants in gaining other industry related construction cards.

Residents invited to open a savings account today through Barking and Dagenham Money

Over £100,000 in affordable loans have so far been handed out to borough residents through our partnership with Leeds Credit Union.

The aim is to help local people become more financially resilient, keep more money in their pockets and access appropriate services to meet their financial needs and ambitions. This is not-for-profit, with all benefits staying in the community.

Help and support available for residents through the Household Support Scheme

Funding is available to vulnerable residents to support them with essentials over the coming months.

- Our money and debt webpages provide an income and expenditure calculator and budgeting tools that will help people understand how much money they have coming in and how much is going out, helping

- them look at areas where they can make savings at www.lbbd.gov.uk/money-and-debt
- Residents who are worried about their finances and need help to tackle debt can now get advice and support from our local Barking and Dagenham Money website at: www.bdmoney.co.uk
- People struggling with increasing energy costs should contact their energy supplier about possible funds they may be entitled to, to help them through difficult periods. They can also access the Warm Homes Grant at www.gov.uk/the-warm-home-discount-scheme
- People with disabilities who aren't claiming specific disability benefits
 may be able to take advantage of a number of benefits available,
 including Personal Independence Payments, Disability Living Allowance
 (for children), and Universal Credit. For those caring for someone with
 disabilities they may be able to claim Carer's Allowance although this is

- People with a water meter who are experiencing financial difficulties may

UK-wide consultation on plans to simplify electronic goods recycling

On 28 December 2023, a joint UK Government, Scottish and Welsh Government and Northern Ireland Executive consultation was launched seeking views on reforms to the Waste Electrical and Electronic Equipment (WEEE) Regulations 2013, which are intended to increase levels of separately collected WEEE for re-use and recycling.

The plans will ensure manufacturers, suppliers and retailers will be responsible for recycling electrical goods.

The government also <u>published a call for evidence seeking views on longer</u> term ways of ensuring the WEEE system supports the circular economy, including how WEEE is treated at the end of its life.

Make Things Right: campaign refresh and toolkit updated

Last year (6 March 2023), the Secretary of State for Levelling Up, Housing & Communities, Rt Hon Michael Gove MP, launched the government's 'Make Things Right' campaign which urges social housing tenants to complain about substandard housing.

DLHUC has refreshed the <u>Make Things Right: campaign toolkit</u> to help councils and other partners to spread the word in their communities and to support residents.

Date set for eligible working parents to apply for free childcare – reminder

On 29 November 2023, the Department for Education announced that applications for free childcare for working parents would open on 2 January 2024.

From January, eligible working parents of two-year-olds will be able to register to access 15 hours free childcare per week from April 2024. The recommended time to register is between mid-January and the end of February.

From 30 November, funding will also be available for new childminders who join the profession or who completed their registration on or after 15 March 2023, or those re-registering at least 12 months after the cancellation of a previous registration.
