Leader's borough update

The Leader mentions us celebrating LGBT+ History Month this February, a national event, which marks lesbian, gay, bisexual and transgender history, as well as celebrating gay rights and the civil rights movements.

He mentions the progressive Pride flag being flown to show support for the LGBT+ community, and to recognise the struggles and campaigns which paved the way for greater equality. He adds that throughout February, we have lined up a programme of events including a poetry open mic night, social events and book displays in our libraries and encourages residents to check it out.

The Leader reminds residents about news coverage on outbreaks of measles in the West Midlands and parts of London and that sadly, the current outbreak of measles is not surprising given the low take up of the MMR vaccine over recent years.

He advises residents that measles spreads easily between people who have not been vaccinated and can be extremely serious, even life-threatening and that the best protection is the MMR vaccine.

The Leader ends by appealing to parents whose child(ren) have missed one or both doses of the MMR vaccine, to contact their GP to book an appointment.



New Police Team launched to focus on Dagenham Heathway

A community focussed push by residents and local businesses has resulted in a new police team being launched to focus on localised issues in Dagenham Heathway.

Residents have been calling for additional police resources in the area to reduce antisocial behaviour and crime.

The new team will provide high visibility and a presence around Dagenham Heathway and respond to issues impacting the local community and businesses. The council's enforcement team will work closely with the police to tackle any issues to make sure residents feel safe and reassured when out and about.

Alongside the police, the council has also launched two new Community Reporting Hubs at Whalebone Lane Community Hub and Dagenham Community Hub in Dagenham Library. Enforcement and Police officers will be at each hub twice a week:

- Dagenham Library Community Hub, every Monday, 3pm to 7pm and every Thursday 10am to 2pm
- Whalebone Lane Community Hub, every Monday 10am to 2pm and every Thursday 11am to 3pm

Residents will be able to report crimes, antisocial behaviour or raise any issues.

Residents encouraged to sign up for council's Green Garden Waste service

Residents are being urged to sign up to the council's Green Garden Waste service ahead of collections beginning in March.

The service, which costs £50 for the year, collects, and recycles flowers, weeds, leaves, grass cuttings, twigs and hedge trimmings. Launched in 2017, the service saw over 7,300 residents sign up last year.

Residents can now take advantage of 19 fortnightly collections between March and December if they sign up before Wednesday 14 February.

The Green Garden Waste service has proved a significant part of the council's efforts to meet the Mayor of London's target of having a 50 per cent recycling rate by 2030.

Council marks LGBT+ History Month



Funding is available to vulnerable residents to support them with essentials over the coming months.

them look at areas where they can make savings at www.lbbd.gov.uk/money-and-debt

- Residents who are worried about their finances and need help to tackle debt can now get advice and support from our local Barking and Dagenham Money website at: <u>www.bdmoney.co.uk</u>
- People struggling with increasing energy costs should contact their energy supplier about possible funds they may be entitled to, to help them through difficult periods. They can also access the Warm Homes Grant at <u>www.gov.uk/the-warm-home-discount-scheme</u>
- People with disabilities who aren't claiming specific disability benefits may be able to take advantage of a number of benefits available, including Personal Independence Payments, Disability Living Allowance (for children), and Universal Credit. For those caring for someone with disabilities they may be able to claim Carer's Allowance although this is means tested, at <u>www.gov.uk/financial-help-disabled/disability-andsickness-benefits</u>
- People with a water meter who are experiencing financial difficulties may want to look into the Watersure scheme at <u>www.ofwat.gov.uk/households/customer-assistance</u>. Most water companies also have a fund to help those who are struggling, and it might be worth contacting their water provider.
- People who are out of work and looking to get into employment can get help and support from our Job Shops at <u>www.lbbd.gov.uk/help-finding-</u> work

Local Government News

Spring Budget: London local government priorities

London Councils has written to the Chancellor of the Exchequer, the Right Hon Jeremy Hunt MP, ahead of the Spring Budget, due to be announced on 6 March, to set out London local government's most pressing priorities, with recommendations aimed at stabilising local public services, protecting the most vulnerable from the cost of living crisis and stimulating economic growth.

These include Extending the Household Support Fund to support our most vulnerable residents; Removing the January 2011 cap on Local Housing Allowance payable for Temporary Accommodation in Housing Benefit subsidy; Providing new funding for delivered wraparound support for newly recognised refugees.

Providing additional funding for council Housing Revenue Accounts to support an improvement in standards throughout 2024/25 and address the critical challenge of damp and mould; Increasing Adult Social Care market sustainability funding to reflect inflationary pressures and increase discharge funding to ensure patients receive reablement support to become physically fit, regain their independence and return to their ordinary residence; Delivering a fully devolved single employment and skills fund to reduce London's huge skills shortages, with three-quarters of firms having open vacancies and two-thirds struggling to fill them; Reintroducing the VAT Retail Export Scheme for foreign visitors to make London and other UK destinations more competitive for overseas shoppers; Establishing a partnership with local government through the Cities Commission on Climate Investment (3Ci) to catalyse private investment into local net zero programmes and pilot neighbourhood level approaches to decarbonisation; Commit to offering deeper devolution to London government.

New report: Managing Falling School Rolls in London

A new report from London Councils highlights that London boroughs are forecasting a drop in demand of 7,904 places across reception and Year 7 between 2023/24 and 2027/28.

The reduction in school places will have a significant impact on the amount of funding a school receives, meaning London schools will have to make further difficult decisions to balance their budgets. This could mean narrowing the curriculum, offering fewer after school clubs or reducing the number of teaching and support staff. In some cases, school leaders and local authority leaders will have to make difficult decisions to merge or close schools.

Responding to the report's findings <u>CIIr Ian Edwards, London Councils</u> <u>Executive Member for Children and Young People</u>, said: "London boroughs are seeing a significant reduction in the number of pupils beginning primary and secondary education, which has major implications for the future of schools across the capital.

"This report comes at a time when unfortunately, some of our schools and local authorities are negotiating a complex balancing act. The drop in demand for places means schools face extremely difficult decisions over how to balance their budgets.

"London has some of the best schools in the country, with over 90% of all our schools being rated good or outstanding by Osted. We are working diligently to ensure that this level of high-quality education is accessible for all children entering schools in the coming years and allow our schools to thrive despite this difficult climate.

"London Councils will work closely with key education partners in London, including government, to mitigate the impact of this drop in demand for school places on school budgets and children's achievement."

The dilemma is that these self-same pressures can make it almost impossible for local government to innovate as radically as it needs to.

Ahead of the regulatory changes for the social housing sector from April 2024, the All-Party Parliamentary Group (APPG) for London hosted a private roundtable event with the Housing Ombudsman last Monday.

The event, which was well attended by MPs, was an opportunity for London MPs and the sector, including boroughs and registered social landlords, to share their views and for an open and honest discussion around the challenges facing housing providers in the capital.

The APPG for London is a forum for MPs and Peers to work together on a cross-party basis to strengthen the capital's voice in Parliament. The group's purpose is to promote the capital in the interests of all Londoners.
