Bangladeshi flag raised to mark the country's 53rd Independence Day

Local councillors, residents and staff joined a flag raising event to mark the 53rd Independence of Bangladesh at a flag raising ceremony outside Barking Town Hall last Tuesday, 26 March.

The event was a commemoration of the country's declaration of independence from Pakistan in the early hours of 26 March 1971. It was also an opportunity to acknowledge members of the borough's Bangladeshi community and their many contributions to the borough.



124 affordable, net zero carbon homes completed in Barking

Last Tuesday, Be First and their contractor, Willmott Dixon celebrated the completion of 124 affordable homes in the Gascoigne neighbourhood. The new block is another step in the council's battle against climate change as it is the first net zero carbon building to be delivered by Be First, which is managing the redevelopment on behalf of the council.

The housing block in the redeveloping Gascoigne neighbourhood, is part of the over 900 homes due to be completed in the first six months of this year by Be First.

Joining the handover event were Council Leader, Councillor Darren Rodwell, Steve Kitchen from Willmott Dixon, and Tim Porter and Geoff Raw from Be First.



First tenants welcomed at Industria

Be First has completed three deals at Industria – the innovative and sustainable industrial scheme launched in 2023. The scheme has been built to provide employment space for local businesses and help the growth of SMEs in the borough. Last Wednesday, Be First staff, Darren Rodwell and the building contractor McLaren, visited these first three tenants in residence at Industria.

CC Dist UK Limited, an electric mobility products business selling goods like electric wheelchairs and electric scooters, has taken 3,024 sq. ft. of space on a 5-year lease, Samosa Haus, a South Asian commercial baking business selling staples like samosas, parathas, curries, and biryani, has taken 1,258 sq. ft. of space on a 5-year lease and Card Galaxy, a trading card distribution business selling rare cards from collectors game like Pokémon, has taken 882 sq. ft. of space on a 5-year lease. The occupiers so far, are all local SME businesses and show how valuable this kind of space is to local jobs and businesses.

Residents urged to make sure their children get the MMR vaccine


Residents may have seen in the news recently that there have been outbreaks of measles in the West Midlands and areas of London.

Sadly, the current outbreak of measles is not surprising given the low take up of the MMR vaccine over recent years and it spreads easily between people who have not been vaccinated.

Measles can be extremely serious, even life-threatening - the best way for residents to protect their children is the MMR vaccine and it is free of charge.

Any resident whose child, regardless of their age, has missed one or both doses of the MMR vaccine, needs to make sure they have the vaccine as soon as possible.

Residents interested in a career in construction invited to get in touch

Residents interested in a career in the construction industry are being invited to get in touch with the Barking Riverside Innovation in Construction Centre (BRIC).

The BRIC training centre in Barking Riverside is offering construction training and qualifications plus brand-new test centre facilities where interested residents can book for their CITB Health, Safety and Environment tests. They will also be able to gain a Level 1 Health and Safety in Construction qualification.

On successful completion of the course, participants will gain the green CSCS labourer card which will allow them to work safely in the construction industry. Staff at the BRIC will also assist participants in gaining other industry related construction cards.

Over £250,000 in loans handed out to residents through BD Money partnership

Over £250,000 in affordable loans have so far been handed out to borough residents through our partnership with Leeds Credit Union.

The partnership aims to bring more affordable loans options and saving accounts to residents through Barking and Dagenham Money (BD Money).

The aim is to help local people become more financially resilient, keep more money in their pockets and access appropriate services to meet their financial needs and ambitions. This is not-for-profit, with all benefits staying in the community.

Households across the borough have saved an estimated £62,500 in interest since the partnership launched in October 2022.

For residents considering opening a savings account through BD Money, it's straight-forward, hassle-free and there's also a wide range of trusted, low-interest loans available.

Help and support available for residents through the Household Support Scheme

Residents who may be struggling with their finances or to make ends meet are being encouraged to get in touch.

Funding is available to vulnerable residents to support them with essentials over the coming months.

- Our Community Food Clubs which are free of charge and can provide £20 worth of food per week for a period of either three or six months at www.lbbd.gov.uk/community-food-clubs
- Our money and debt webpages provide an income and expenditure calculator and budgeting tools that will help people understand how

much money they have coming in and how much is going out, helping them look at areas where they can make savings at <u>www.lbbd.gov.uk/money-and-debt</u>

- Residents who are worried about their finances and need help to tackle debt can now get advice and support from our local Barking and Dagenham Money website at: <u>www.bdmoney.co.uk</u>
- People struggling with increasing energy costs should contact their energy supplier about possible funds they may be entitled to, to help them through difficult periods. They can also access the Warm Homes Grant at <u>www.gov.uk/the-warm-home-discount-scheme</u>
- People with disabilities who aren't claiming specific disability benefits may be able to take advantage of a number of benefits available, including Personal Independence Payments, Disability Living Allowance (for children), and Universal Credit. For those caring for someone with disabilities they may be able to claim Carer's Allowance although this is means tested, at <u>www.gov.uk/financial-help-disabled/disability-andsickness-benefits</u>
- People with a water meter who are experiencing financial difficulties may want to look into the Watersure scheme at <u>www.ofwat.gov.uk/households/customer-assistance</u>. Most water companies also have a fund to help those who are struggling, and it might be worth contacting their water provider.
- People who are out of work and looking to get into employment can get help and support from our Job Shops at <u>www.lbbd.gov.uk/help-finding-</u> work
- Anyone worried about a lack of skills can find courses and support on the Adult College website at <u>https://adultcollege.lbbd.gov.uk/</u>
- Residents who need help with emergency living expenses for food, fuel (gas and electric for customers who pay via a key meter), travel expenses and household appliances and/or clothing in exceptional circumstances can apply for help from our Hardship Fund (Individual Assistance Payment) at <u>https://www.lbbd.gov.uk/benefits-and-</u> <u>support/discretionary-hardship-support/discretionary-financial-support-</u> <u>schemes</u>.

Local Government News

50 years of local government

Today, 1 April 2024 marks the 50th anniversary for hundreds of councils across the country created under the Local Government Act 1972. The act brought major changes to the local government system and reduced the number of councils from 1,245 to 412 from April 1974.

The anniversary is an opportunity to celebrate those councils, recognise and highlight the important contribution they make to their communities, and showcase the value of local government. It's also an opportunity to focus on the people – leaders, councillors and officers – who have served their local residents over the last half century.

Latest residents' satisfaction polling

The LGA's latest national polling into resident perceptions of local government, conducted in February 2024, is <u>now available</u>. The latest results show a drop in overall levels of satisfaction and there has also been a fall in the percentage of people who agree their council provides value for money to its lowest recorded level.

However, the proportion of respondents who trust their local council and feel it keeps them informed has remained broadly consistent with the last round of polling in June.

There has been an increase in the proportion of people who trust their local council to take decisions in their over central government and an overall increase in those who agree it's important to treat local politicians with respect and courtesy. Although they have noticed a decline in levels of satisfaction

across key indicators in recent years, this is in the context of research showing similar trends in other parts of government and the public sector.

The survey also asked how people how they access information about their council and the services it provides and in the last three rounds of polling, the top three responses have been word of mouth, the council website and printed information.
